

Historic City Hall Building Ownership Officially Transfers to Henry Point Development

It's been a long time coming, but both Henry Point Development and the City of Milwaukie have signed off on the closing documents, making Henry Point Development officially the new owner of the historic city hall building at 10722 SE Main St. Over the coming weeks and months, the building will see some increased activity. Crews have begun demolition in the interior of the building in preparation for the remodel. They have also installed a fence around the building as a security measure, however, no changes will be made to the exterior. The façade will remain intact.

Taking a Look at Tax Constraints and Service Levels

I like to use this space to promote exciting things going on in Milwaukie, such as the upcoming construction kick-off for our three new parks, but this month I have something more serious on my mind, so my apologies in advance for the somber tone of this article.

In my first few years as a city councilor, the finance director at the time routinely warned us of an impending "fiscal cliff" that within five years, the city would not have the revenue to fund the activities in the budget that residents had come to expect. That cliff is now closer at hand.

Cities and counties across Oregon are hamstrung by our crazy property tax laws, under which tax revenue can only increase by 3% per year. We all know that even before the recent inflationary times, costs of salaries and most goods and services went up faster than 3% per year. The property tax system created in the 1990s under Measures 5 and 50 really set communities up for failure and created

very inequitable results, even between two houses on the same block. In 2016, the League of Oregon Cities produced a thorough assessment of the inequities of the system, which can be read at https://bit.ly/48oBkas.

These tax constraints have not limited the increase in your tax bill to 3% per year because they lead to proliferation of "special districts" to operate library districts or swimming pools or other amenities a community wants. And to operating levies to fund shortfalls, like the ones passed last year for the Clackamas Fire District and the North Clackamas School District, and the one in Gresham for police and fire services that did not get voter approval. In the 22 years I have owned my home, the number of line items on my property tax bill has grown from 15 to 26. In the same period, the City of Milwaukie property tax has grown by \$250, but has shrunk significantly as a portion of my overall bill. In 2002, Milwaukie property tax was 38% of my overall tax bill – now it is under 19%. The bond voters passed for the Ledding Library is another 1.5% of the total bill.

In Milwaukie, we've been very fortunate to have a city manager and team that have been successful at finding ways to streamline, as well as capitalize on grant opportunities to fund projects, such that the 5-year fiscal cliff has been staved off for several years. But, we are reaching a point where basic city services may be impacted by cuts in the upcoming budget cycle.

City council has also been focused on how to best provide for the development and upkeep of our parks system, which may mean leaving the North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District (NCPRD) and taking over our own parks. That will necessitate hiring additional staff. It has been apparent for a decade or more that the NCPRD tax rate of \$0.54 per thousand of assessed value is inadequate to build and maintain the parks that Milwaukians want and deserve. Not only has the County Commission put a halt to finishing Milwaukie Bay Park, but the things residents routinely ask for – skateparks, splash pads, dog parks, pickleball courts – will not be possible at the current tax rate, which is the lowest in the state for a parks and recreation district.

No one likes to pay more taxes. But in the coming months, I do think we need a community dialogue about whether shortened library hours, reduced police staffing, longer wait times for building and other permits, and removal (rather than replacement) of damaged park equipment are acceptable to residents or whether we should consider looking for additional revenue to support the level of service residents have come to expect.

Shane Abma Appointed Interim City Councilor



Last month, city council appointed Shane Abma to the position recently vacated by Desi Nicodemus. He was sworn in by Judge Kimberly Graves immediately following the appointment. Abma previously served on city council from 2017-2019, and currently works as a senior attorney for Metro Regional Government.

Emergency Kits on a Budget

Emergency preparedness can be a scary topic, and many people would rather not think about what they will do in an emergency. Still, building an emergency kit is one of the best ways to keep a household safe after a natural disaster. Planning as a family can even be a fun, shared activity that helps children to feel less worried about emergencies. There are many things households can do to prepare an emergency kit on a budget. The amount budgeted, ten dollars per week, may be high for some families. If a household cannot afford that kind of investment, however, it is worthwhile to spread the cost out over a few weeks to get ready.

When preparing an emergency kit, the first thing to consider is time. After a major disaster, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends having enough supplies to last for two weeks without outside assistance or going to the grocery store. In a major disaster, it could take that long for help to arrive.

After time, the next consideration should be water. Generally, one gallon of water per person per day is a good goal. This means that families will want to have 14 gallons of water per person to last two weeks. While a gallon a day may sound like a lot, consider that that gallon is for cooking, drinking and sanitation. Pre-packaged bottled water is the safest choice. Gallons of water can be purchased for under two dollars at most local grocery stores. For anyone wishing to store tap water, information about how to sanitize it for long-term storage can be found at **milwaukieoregon.gov/emergencyprep**. As with all preparation, if there is not enough money or space in a home for 14 gallons of water per person, something is better than nothing. Even a few days of water will help to keep a family hydrated until more help can be organized.

Milwaukie Police Department Updates



In January, a joint effort by 15 traffic officers from various jurisdictions, including the Milwaukie Police Department (MPD), was conducted in Milwaukie, resulting in 160 traffic stops, 208 citations issued, 84 warnings and three arrests.

On Jan. 28, officers responded to a collision in Milwaukie, where a 67-year-old woman was hit by a vehicle suffering critical, but

non-life-threatening injuries. The driver was arrested for DUI, Assault II and Vehicular Assault of a Pedestrian.

On Jan. 24, officers arrested a trespasser with drone assistance near SE Linwood Avenue. During the incident, a speeding Chevrolet Camaro struck an MPD patrol vehicle. The driver was arrested for DUI, Reckless Driving and Recklessly Endangering. The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office managed the crash investigation.

Behavioral Health Specialist Glen Suchanek, along with partnerships with LoveOne and Central City Concern, are making strides in addressing unhoused and transitional community members with Tuesday outreach sessions equipping officers with a ready resource.

Strides were made in staffing as officers Kwasean Akom and Tim Cleary completed training after a 13-month process, including interviews, background checks, academy training and a Field Training and Evaluation program, enabling them to work independently. The MPD is continuing to train and add police officers each month, including a dedicated traffic officer. Have a safe March!

Planning Commission Hearing for Neighborhood Hubs on March 12

Phase 2 of the Neighborhood Hubs project is nearly complete! The project team has analyzed the feedback and survey responses, and drafted the proposed code language for the Neighborhood Hub areas. The goal for these code amendments is to support and encourage hubs-type development and businesses in the identified areas.

Key proposed amendments:

- Rezone properties in the Limited Commercial zone (C-L) to Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU) and eliminate the Limited Commercial zone.
- Create a new Small-Scale Mixed-Use zone (SMU)
- Rezone properties in the Neighborhood Commercial zone (C-N) to Small-Scale Mixed Use and eliminate the Neighborhood Commercial zone.
- Rezone a portion of the Milwaukie Floral site at 3306 SE Lake Rd. from Residential-Moderate Density to the new Small-Scale Mixed Use zone
- Expand the 42nd Avenue NMU zone by rezoning the Chapel Theatre site at 4107-4117 SE Harrison St. from Residential-High Density to Neighborhood Mixed Use

The Planning Commission public hearing about the proposed amendments is **Tuesday, March 12**, and the proposed code language can be reviewed at www.milwaukieoregon.gov/ planning/za-2024-001. Milwaukie's Mills



From Bob's Red Mill to Milwaukie Lumber, the remnants of Milwaukie's industrial history are still present today even though mills no longer line Milwaukie Bay. Like many cities built alongside major rivers, those in the Willamette Valley harnessed the flow of water to power mills and increase production. Here, hydropower was used to grind locally-grown wheat into flour for nationwide distribution. The first Milwaukie grain mill opened in 1848, an adjunct to the already-established sawmill, and, by 1855, multiple mills were established within city limits.

Standard Flour Mill Milwaukie has been home to many saw and grist mills over the decades, but few, if any, would loom as large as Standard Flour. Built in 1853, the Standard Flour Mill became a stable resource for local settlers and other nearby markets. When the mill first opened, it was able to produce 10 barrels of flour per day, an output which would eventually be multiplied tenfold, and used to supply booming mining towns in California and southern Oregon, as well as other growing cities, such as Seattle and Vancouver, B.C.
