Elizabeth Start Selected as the Volunteer of the Year for 2022 by City Council

City Council recently selected Elizabeth Start as the 2022 Volunteer of the Year. Start has volunteered with the city since 2016. She first served on the city's Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee, which helped shape the plan that will guide growth and development in the city for the next 20 years. Start has also been involved with the Linwood Neighborhood District Association for many years, becoming the vice chair in 2021 and then chair in 2022. In that role she leads Adopt-A-Road volunteer events, helps plan the neighborhood's annual block party, coordinates monthly meetings, and much more. Start is currently an active member of the city's Equity Steering Committee, which began meeting in January 2022. Her involvement in the committee was invaluable as it established itself and developed a mission, vision and goals.

Her volunteerism doesn't stop at Milwaukie's city limits. Since 2014, she has shared her expertise with the community about reducing, reusing and recycling as a Master Recycler. Start is also a member of the Oregon Recycling Advisory Council representing small businesses. She is a board member of the Women's Foundation of Oregon, an organization that tackles some of the most challenging issues facing women, girls, and gender expansive people today. If that wasn't enough, Start also volunteers with ReDeploy, an organization that hires veterans to repair household goods to be donated to other veterans who are receiving housing.

When asked what advice she'd give to someone interested in volunteering, Start said, "The best way to get started is by just jumping in! Think about a cause or group you love, find a non-profit that supports them and reach out. Be brave!"

Those That Influence Us And How You Can Influence Them

It may come as a surprise to learn the number of government bodies and special districts that influence us in Milwaukie.

Clackamas County is very important providing Milwaukie with a wide range of services, including elections, criminal prosecutions, tax collection, mental health, social services, affordable housing, sewers, and parks through a special service district. This is just a partial list of functions under the elected Board of County Commissioners.

Fire service is provided by a separate Clackamas Fire District governed by an elected Board of Directors. Similarly, our schools are administered by the North Clackamas School District with their own elected School Board.

Less well known is Metro, which performs regional planning and coordination on land use, recycling, landfills, regional parks, and public spaces like the zoo and convention and expo centers. Very importantly, Metro manages the area's urban growth boundary, which is designed to control urban sprawl to protect farmland and forests. Metro is governed by an elected Metro Council.

Because each of these organizations can impact Milwaukie, the city maintains close contact with these groups and others. Each city councilor is assigned to several of these organizations for coordination and to represent the interests of Milwaukie.

However, the residents of Milwaukie play an even more important role with these organizations through the election process. National and state-wide elections get so much attention that local elections are often neglected. Frequently 20% or more of voters who may vote the top of the ballot do not choose candidates at the bottom of the ballot.

We have a special election on May 16, and I would urge all to vote the entire ballot. The fire district has a proposed levy for fire and emergency services, there are several special district elections, and the school board election offers very different choices for the board.

I get it—how can one make an informed choice? Oregon is fortunate to have a Voter's Pamphlet that brings all the candidates and resolutions together in one place to help you decide. Some states do not have such voter guides, and Oregon's pamphlet is considered one of the most comprehensive. Make the Voter's Pamphlet your first stop to vote the entire ballot even in midterm and special elections!

Milwaukie Using 100% Oregon Solar Electricity for City Operations

To offset the carbon emissions produced by the city to power its public facilities, it purchases renewable energy from Portland General Electric from a variety of approved renewable sources. In early 2020, the city signed up for the new PGE renewable product called 'Green Future Impact' (GFI) that would support the development of Oregon-based renewable energy tied to the PGE electrical grid. By May 2023, GFI's first solar facility will be finished and online, supplying Milwaukie with 100% Oregon solar for city operations.

By switching renewable energy products to Green Future Impact, Milwaukie will save more than \$700 per month, or roughly \$8,500 a year. Using carbon-free electricity for city operations avoids 1,377 metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions, about the same amount as powering and heating 173 homes for more than a year or driving 297 passenger vehicles for more than a year. Choosing local solar energy supports Oregon's green economy, makes the grid more resilient, and helps the city reach its goal of becoming carbon-free from electricity by 2030.

Information About Upcoming Construction

With warmer months coming up, improvement projects around Milwaukie will begin construction. City Publishes Award-Winning Financial Reports

The city's finance department recently published two important financial documents—the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) and the People's Annual Financial Report (PAFR). These documents are the result of the financial audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

Why are these reports important?

The ACFR is the city's record of financial status. It is published after rigorous testing by outside auditors to ensure the city's finances are managed to generally accepted accounting practices (GAAP), and an auditor review of the resulting reports. This is a technical document used by banks, underwriters, bond rating agencies and bond purchasers to measure the City of Milwaukie's financial stability.

The PAFR provides an overview of city government, goals and accomplishments, along with high-level information from the ACFR. It is presented in a brief and easily understood format for those without a background in finance.



The Government Finance Officer's Association (GFOA) sets best-practice standards in financial reporting for the ACFR, PAFR and biennium budget documents with an awards program for agencies that meet or exceed those standards. The city has received the Excellence in Financial Reporting award

for the ACFR every year since 2011 and is one of only eight government agencies in Oregon to get a triple crown for winning the award for all three documents. Neighborhood Hubs Work in May

In May, the Neighborhood Hubs project team is focusing on initial zoning code review to identify conflicts between the goals and objectives for hubs and the city's current code; and, initial outreach to property owners, business owners and community-based organizations in the identified hub locations.

This early outreach is to help identify property owners, businesses and community organizations who are interested in pursuing hub-like activities with a particular focus on underrepresented communities. Since the city is not planning to acquire property for the development of hubs, these groups will play a large role in determining how, and if, hubs develop over time. The city would like to learn about any future goals for hub development, raise awareness about the hubs project, and welcome those participating in future stages of the project. The city is also looking to understand how the COVID-19 pandemic affected these groups and how needs may have changed since the pandemic began. Additionally, city staff will meet with each of the Neighborhood District Associations in May and June to talk about the project. Feedback received from these activities is used to develop strategies that encourage hub development and will help set the stage for a larger community events this summer. Historic Preservation Month

May is Historic Preservation Month. In 1973, the National Trust of Historic Preservation created the month to highlight the importance of preserving places reflecting American history and architecture. The Milwaukie Museum is celebrating this event on May 16 during the City Council regular session meeting. The preservation of historic places has a positive impact on communities by strengthening neighborhoods and providing a physical link to the past. Historic places tell a story about the locations and people that helped shape what the community is today.

Milwaukie Museum coordinated an historic home tour in the Island Station neighborhood in 2019, and is currently working on an historic home inventory list with the State Historic Preservation Office. The museum also offers a home history program to learn more about your home's history and past owners. Crack Seal Work on Streets Begins in Late May



The city maintains about 75 miles of paved road surfaces with the goal of extending their serviceable life in an efficient and fiscally-responsible manner. With that goal in mind, crews will clean the cracks in the

road and apply a sealant to about three miles of residential streets over the course of two to three days beginning on Monday, May 29. This work is being done in preparation for an upcoming slurry seal project—details about this project will be included in the June issue of *The Pilot* newsletter.

During the crack seal work, roads are closed to all foot, bicycle and vehicle traffic from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Notices about the work and closure (typically a doorhanger) will be delivered to community members and businesses that may be affected by the work at least 36 to 72 hours before it begins. The city will also coordinate with the crews to make sure trash, recycling and yard debris pick-ups are not interrupted or postponed.

The neighborhood partnered with members of the Rotary Club of Milwaukie, Milwaukie Garden Club and Milwaukie Floral & Garden to plant native plants in the bump outs on Main Street in an effort to transform the downtown area into a pollinator pathway. Planting native shrubs and trees help provide the best conditions for insects, butterflies and birds to move throughout downtown and help beautify the historic neighborhood. Neil Schulman, executive director of the North Clackamas Watersheds Council, spoke at last month's meeting about the history of the original dam, built in 1858, that create Kellogg Lake. He spoke about how his organization is working to scan the lake bottom, test the sediment and helping with plans for the removal of the current dam under SE McLoughlin Boulevard in 2026 or 2027. This will open up 15 miles of fish passage into the Mt. Scott watershed, and create trails and additional access to Milwaukie Bay Park.
