Milwaukie Fest, the City's Newest Summer Event, Comes to Downtown on July 11, 12 and 13

The city's newest summer event—Milwaukie Fest—is a free weekend-long celebration from Friday, July 11 through Sunday, July 13. For those new to Milwaukie or long-time residents, there is something for everyone at Milwaukie Fest. Kicking off the festivities on July 11 is a free movie screening at Ardenwald Elementary sponsored by North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District. Pre-show entertainment is a performance from Couch Brass sponsored by the Milwaukie Arts Committee as part of its annual Porchfest series.

On Saturday, July 12, four blocks of Main Street, from Jackson Street to the south downtown plaza, are transformed into activity centers. Each center will feature fun activities, games, vendors, music and more. Highlights include a free class from Milwaukie Jazzercise, music and magic from Angel Ocasio, a dance off between Millie T. Goose and an equine challenger, and an afternoon of Pacific Northwest Blue Collar Wrestling, ending with a battle royale for the Milwaukie Fest Golden Goose Championship Belt. Several community events will coincide with Saturday's festivities. The Milwaukie Mile is held at 8 a.m. on the Trolley Trail, and the Milwaukie Parks Foundation, along with the North Clackamas Watersheds Council, will hold their annual duck race at Kellogg Dam at 5:30 p.m. Businesses throughout downtown will also host live music throughout the evening.

The event wraps up on July 13 with the annual children's day at the Milwaukie Farmers Market. Come out for face painting, crafts and special promotions throughout the day.

Downtown parking is limited, however, TriMet bus and MAX services both make stops near the festival. Bicycle parking is also provided. Interested in helping bring the event to life? May is Wildfire Prevention **Month**



In Oregon, May is designated as Wildfire Awareness Month. Clackamas Fire is engaged in a month-long campaign to encourage, empower and inform the community to help prevent and prepare for wildfire.

There are many things that can be done to prepare for wildfire. One of those is following Clackamas Fire's Ready, Set, Go program. Getting *ready* before wildfire happens is the first step in protecting lives and property from the threat of wildfire. Begin in the spring by creating defensible space around homes and property. Defensible space is a 100-foot buffer zone between a home and the surrounding wildland area.

Getting set means creating and preparing a wildfire action plan. The plan will be unique to each family and should include everyone, even pets. The plan is a check list that includes different evacuation routes and emergency meeting locations.

Wildfires are unpredictable, move quickly and change direction without warning. When wildfire approaches homes, it is time to go! Evacuating early gives people the best chance of surviving, while also helping to avoid getting caught in smoke, fire and traffic jams. It's also important in a wildfire emergency to stay informed. Pay attention to news and information from local authorities, and sign-up for emergency notifications at Clackamas County Public Alerts.

The threat of wildfire in the area is real, but following the Ready, Set, Go program helps community members increase their chances of surviving a wildfire emergency. For more information, visit clackamasfire. com/readyset-go.

Getting Curious About Conflict

Saturday, May 11, 3 PM Library Community Room

Interpersonal conflict and disagreement are part of being in relationship with others, but many fear conflict. Motivated by many factors, including cultural norms, concern for social consequences and personal safety, many avoid it. What might people learn and grow by making more room for conflict? What skills are needed to responsibly engage in conflict? How can shifting the relationship to conflict offer new personal perspectives and the groups people belong to? This community conversation is an opportunity to reflect on relationships to interpersonal conflict outside of where it's most often encountered. Facilitator Emily Squires leads a judgement- and jargon-free discussion of what conflict means, how interpersonal conflict shapes lives and tools to use when experiencing it. Squires is an artist, facilitator and consultant who has spent more than two decades working with various organizations. Squires works with groups across sectors, from small nonprofit organizations to government bureaucracies, to think and feel through the complexities of identity, conflict and long-term culture transformation.

What Matters at Life's End? Exploring End-of-Life Wishes

Most know they should talk about what matters at the end of their lives, but don't always know where or how to start these conversations. Once people start exploring death and dying, they often realize it's not so scary to talk about after all. It can be comforting and empowering to know more about their options, and consider what would be helpful for those who may be making decisions on their behalf. This conversation, facilitated by Wendy Usher, provides a space and dedicated time for reflecting and exploring end-of-life wishes. Usher is a community volunteer who is passionate about end-oflife education and advocacy. She works directly with hospice patients through Housecall Providers and on broader efforts with Hopewell House and Compassion & Choices. After a career in philanthropy, Usher has focused on expanding conversations about death and dying, and educating people about end-of-life options.
