Fire Burns Nearly Two Acres of Elk Rock Island, Area Closed to Begin Restoration Efforts

Last month, a fire broke out on the eastern edge of Elk Rock Island, burning just under two acres of natural area. As a safety measure, Elk Rock Island is closed to the public until further notice due to fire damage. Spring Park remains open, however, the trail leading to Elk Rock Island is also closed.

Please do not enter the site. The area is still an active burn site and poses risk to workers and visitors. Hazards include fallen trees and branches, unstable ground and stumps, as well as roots potentially still smoldering. The closure will also allow North Clackamas Parks & Recreation District, City of Milwaukie and Clackamas Fire District #1 to address the damages and begin restoration.

A beloved community treasure on the Willamette River, Elk Rock Island contains sensitive habitats that are home to a diverse array of plant and animal species. Although it may take a while for the site to recover, eventually regrowth will happen and wildlife will return.

A special thank you to Clackamas Fire District #1 and the Milwaukie Police Department for their work to quickly containing the fire, limiting damage and preventing the need for evacuations in the nearby neighborhoods.

Dealing With the Stresses of 2020

"Because 2020!" one of my neighbors exclaimed as we looked incredulously at the huge orangish smoke cloud moving north into Milwaukie a couple of weeks back. Indeed, I'm sure many of you, like me, are ready to be finished with 2020.

Against the backdrop of a global pandemic, we find ourselves needing to address and start to remedy centuries of systematic racism. We have a very tense national political situation and an election crucial to our health as a nation. The parents among us are juggling their own jobs with facilitating their children's online schooling, or with childcare duties. Others among us have lost jobs and face dire economic struggles. Then to top it off, a windstorm and wildfires gave us ten days of unhealthy air and destroyed homes of many in our county. And a blaze also took out some important habitat on our beloved Elk Rock Island.

And I can't sugar-coat it—it seems likely to get harder as the colder, damper weather comes in and reduces our ability to eat outside, to recreate, to visit with friends and neighbors on the front porch. Many holiday traditions will be impossible. More of us will feel isolated. Yes, it feels to many of us like armageddon has arrived. But Milwaukians have also shown great support and caring for others in the community, from the Hidden Hearts Milwaukie phenomenon, to support for food banks, to the amazing outpouring of support for folks displaced by the fires. And the Milwaukie Arts Committee found a way to inject some community spirit with Porchfest.

I wish I had some more consoling wisdom to impart, but I only plead with you to do two things before we kick 2020 to the dustbin of history:

Vote. Spend some time pouring over your voter's pamphlet. If you don't want to wait for it to show up in the mail, you can review it online at <https://bit.ly/365W22y>. It's not just about the presidential contest, but also ballot measures on the state and county level, and races, including County Commissioner and two City Council seats here in Milwaukie. Get those ballots in. Drop boxes are located at City Hall, the Public Safety Building and Clackamas Community College Harmony Campus.

Be kind. To your loved ones, neighbors and others in the community, but also to yourselves. Maybe it's time to take up a new hobby you've always wanted to try? Or to reconnect virtually with old friends you've lost touch with? We each cope with 2020's stresses in different ways. Me, I garden, play cards with friends online, and have three different online movie discussion groups. I'm thinking of taking up the ukelele. Whatever it is that helps keep you sane, do it, or try something new.

2020 will end and a vaccine will, at some point in 2021, return us to some semblance of normal life. There are so many unknowns that it is hard to see the light at the end of the tunnel, but like the sun behind the smoke clouds, it is there. We are all in this together.

City Council Reviews Equity and Policing



Last month, City Manager Ann Ober and Police Chief Luke Strait provided the first of many updates to City Council about the work the city is doing related to policing and equity. The meeting included a presentation from the Criminal Justice Commission on traffic stop

data that Milwaukie can use to help assess racial bias in policing, and Chief Strait presented information about his department's policies regarding use of force and de-escalation. City Council also shared an overview of what they learned from recent listening sessions with Black, Indigenous and people of color who live in Milwaukie.

This month, the city hopes to bring on board a new equity program manager to help guide its work, and focus more intently on how and where police are responding to people who are in crisis due to mental health challenges, as well as housing insecurity.

Neighborhoods Host City Council Candidates Forum on Oct. 8



Home Energy Scores Now Required on Public Home Listings and Advertisements



Starting Oct. 1, home energy scores are required for qualified homes publicly listed for sale in Milwaukie. These scores are a simple way to understand a home's energy efficiency.

Getting a home energy score is relatively easy. Working with a qualified home assessor trained in the U.S. Department of Energy home energy scoring methodology, sellers schedule a quick assessment and work with their real estate agent to post a link to the report on the home's public listing. Knowing more about a home can help sellers advertise improvements and help buyers make more informed decisions.

The Tragic Story of Ulisse Edera



Born in Canelli, Italy in August 1890, Ulisse emigrated to the United States at age 23. After becoming a citizen, he joined the army and was a veteran of WWI. In 1925, Ulisse and his wife Daria built a house on SE 32nd Avenue and farmed 22 acres, then known as Johnson Creek Farms. Every inch of Ulisse's small yard was planted with vegetables and flowers. He grew 200 pounds of garlic every year, drying and selling it, along with homemade vinegar.

On Nov. 5, 1993, Ulisse was beaten to death inside his home. Five juveniles who were a couple of blocks away from Ulisse's home at a party reportedly left to mess around with cars in the area, likely trying to break into them. They stumbled upon Ulisse's house and, after seeing several newspapers stacked up on the front porch, assumed no one was home. According to a police report, the youths knocked on the door and ran back to the street. When no one answered, three of them forced their way in through a rear window, but fled when they noticed someone was in the house. They went back to where the party was and, after talking about it for a while, decided to go back. The juveniles broke into the home and one or more of them beat Ulisse to death with a chair or table leg, then took several items from the home. He was 103 when he was murdered and is the oldest homicide victim in Oregon history. The crime, trial and sentencing, which included a life sentence for one of the youth involved, made national headlines.

Ulisse Edera's name still lives on. David Yudkin, owner of HOTLIPS Pizza, became acquainted with Ulisse in 1984, and saved and propagated seeds from Ulisse's own tomato plants. Today, David sells the plants "with a direct line to seeds brought from Italy in 1916" during an annual plant sale to benefit Opal Creek.

Tree and Shrub Pruning Begins Week of Oct. 12

Trees and shrubs are an important part of a vibrant, livable community, providing many services and benefits. Like many things, they need regular maintenance. Pruning is an important part of plant maintenance and, in the case of trees and shrubs, can be necessary for safety as well.



While this is primarily the responsibility of property owners, each March and October city staff prune problem areas along the street to provide clearance for emergency vehicles, street sweepers and other high clearance vehicles. Property owners are encouraged to do this themselves as staff prune for compliance, not aesthetics. This work will begin the week of Oct. 12.

Clearance over streets and sidewalks is important for visibility, access and proper functionality of the Milwaukie's streets and stormwater system. City code requires property owners to prune trees and shrubs over streets and sidewalks (MMC 12.12.010). Pruning should allow 12 feet of clearance over the street and eight feet of clearance over the sidewalk. Shrubs should not encroach into the roadway or sidewalk. McBrod Avenue Improvements Update



The McBrod Avenue improvement project, located between SE 17th Avenue and Ochoco Street, is nearly complete. The city enhanced pedestrian safety by building a continuous ADA-compliant sidewalk on the east side of McBrod Avenue. The city also addressed needed repairs and upgrades to the water, stormwater and sewer systems. Unsafe air quality due to recent wildfire smoke delayed completion of the roadway base and asphalt pavement, but reconstruction of the road will be completed in fall 2020.


