Community Invited to Celebrate the Official Grand Opening of the New City Hall Building on Friday, Oct. 6

On **Friday, Oct. 6 at 4 p.m.**, the City of Milwaukie will say its final goodbyes to the historic city hall building, located at 10722 SE Main St., that has served the community for 85 years. City Council President Desi Nicodemus, Milwaukie Historical Society President Steve Bennett and others will provide the final remarks for the building, capping a storied legacy as a major focal point in Milwaukie both physically and symbolically. After the building's doors are locked for the last time, community members, City Council and staff will parade down Main Street to the new city hall building accompanied by the Milwaukie High School marching band.

After arriving at the new city hall building, located at 10501 SE Main St., Mayor Lisa Batey, City Manager Ann Ober and others will deliver a few brief remarks and the city will host an official ribbon-cutting ceremony. Following the ribbon-cutting, the community is invited to tour the new building and enjoy some refreshments in the new community room.

The city has now invested in its future with a move to a new city hall. This 21st century facility will serve our community well, consolidating most city operations in one location. It provides the space, technology and environment for the delivery of effective and efficient municipal services. I hope you will join us on **Friday, Oct. 6 at 4 p.m.** as we march

a couple of blocks from historic city hall to the new city hall for its grand opening. There will be music, a ribbon cutting, refreshments and an open house. Don't miss this event!

Our historic city hall has a lot of character, and the blue-ribbon committee that considered its future wanted to maintain its historic exterior. A developer with a track record of historic preservation was chosen to repurpose our charming historic city hall. When redevelopment is complete, Milwaukie will have additional food and beverage options on this site, while safeguarding the historical significance of the property. You may actually spend more time at historic city hall with these new amenities than you did in the past.

We don't know if the city will operate out of its new facility for 85 years. But it's a pretty good bet that it will be the center of operations for a long time, which is why it is a long-term investment. I would ask you to consider making a personal long-term investment in your city as well. My long-term investment will be to plant a tree. It's simple and affordable with so many benefits like natural beauty, wildlife habitat, clean air and urban temperature reduction. This long-term investment will not only benefit us now, but future generations of Milwaukie residents as well.

My tree choice will be the Pacific Dogwood. It is our city's nickname after all, my neighbor's dogwoods are glorious during their spring bloom, and its lifespan can be longer than 100 years. Prime tree planting season is approaching, and new trees helps Milwaukie achieve its 2040 goal of a 40% tree canopy.

Library Lecture Series Highlights Contributions of Chinese Immigrants

Milwaukie Historical Society, in partnership with the Northwest China Council, Ledding Library, Willamette Falls Studio and City of Milwaukie, presents the next installment of the Ledding Library Lecture Series, *Chinese Immigrants: Contributions and Exclusion*, on **Wednesday, Oct. 4 at 6 p.m.** The lecture is in the Ledding Library (10660 SE 21st St.) and through Zoom.

Chinese Immigrants: Contributions and Exclusion

focuses on the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 and its impacts on the local Chinese population. It will also discuss two important people who contributed to Milwaukie's history—Si Sing and Ah Bing, cultivator of the Bing cherry, along with the Northwest China Council's role in creating regional and global Chinese relationships.

Keynote speaker Janet Lee will discuss the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882. She is the secretary and director for the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association and vice president of Portland Lee's Family Association. Speakers Jim Mockford and David Kohl will discuss the Northwest China Council. The lecture will also include a special greeting by Milwaukie resident Susanna Pai and a special address by City Council President Desi Nicodemus.

Upcoming Workshops for Phase 2 of Neighborhood Hubs Project

The neighborhood hubs team wants to hear from the community! Staff spent the summer interviewing property owners and neighbors, analyzing the identified neighborhood hubs to groundtruth earlier information, and preparing a prioritization list of hubs. Staff also reviewed city code to identify any gaps between what people wanted in the hubs and what the code would allow. Finally, the team worked on possible economic development tools and resources to spur activity.

The team has ideas about next steps, potential zoning changes and economic development tools, and wants to share them to see if they got it right. A series of in-person workshops have been scheduled in October, so mark those calendars!

Transportation System Plan Update Begins in October

The City of Milwaukie is embarking on a significant journey to enhance its transportation system. The last major update was in 2008, with a partial update in 2013. Since then, the city has worked to make Milwaukie's streets safer, more interconnected, and comfortable for everyone who walks, drives, rides public transit or bikes. The time has come for a comprehensive update to the transportation system plan, beginning this month and concluding in early 2025.

What exactly is a Transportation System Plan (TSP)? It's a blueprint that lays out the city's transportation system and charts the course for projects, programs and policies to meet present and future transportation needs, and encompasses all modes of transportation.

This undertaking is substantial and the city can't do it alone. Milwaukie is counting on the community's involvement to gain insights into how the transportation system functions and how it can be improved. The TSP Advisory Committee will collaborate closely with city staff, consultants and the community throughout the update. These committee members, selected by City Council, represent a diverse range of transportation interests, experiences and neighborhoods.

Fire Prevention Month: Home Escape Plans

October is Fire Prevention Month. This is a good time to plan and practice escape plans.

Create a home escape plan and review it with family members, especially children. Draw a home map or layout marking two exits from every room and path from each exit to the outside. Mark the location of all smoke alarms—there should be at least one on every level, in each bedroom, and near all sleeping areas. Test the alarms monthly to ensure they are working. Pick a meeting place outside the home where everyone will meet after exiting. Make sure everyone knows how to call 9-1-1 from a cell phone or a neighbor's phone, once household members are safely outside.
