## City Council Adopts New Goal Focused on Equity, Inclusion and Justice

Each year, City Council adopts three overarching goals to focus their efforts, as well as the work carried out by staff to achieve the city's vision. Typically, goals are adopted annually, shortly after the new year. Last month, however, City Council changed its goal previously focused on community engagement, and adopted a new goal addressing equity, inclusion and justice.

With this goal, City Council commits itself to building better relationships with Milwaukie's Black, Indigenous and people of color (BIPOC) community members and further their own education about systemic racism. City Council will also partner with the city manager to provide diversity, equity and inclusion training for all staff, including the Milwaukie Police Department, and review city policies, practices and codes with an equity lens. A budget adjustment request is also anticipated to help move additional resources to carry out this work.

The city took one of its first steps in pursuit of this new goal last month. A series of virtual listening sessions were held with members of Milwaukie's BIPOC community to better understand their experiences, and receive feedback about needed improvements and changes.

## A Moment in History to Make Unprecedented Change

There are inflection points throughout history that provide opportunity for momentous change. We find ourselves in the midst of such now. Between the economic and social disruption wrought by a global pandemic, a long simmering racial justice reckoning and the final count down on our opening to forestall the worst effects of climate chaos, we find ourselves at the mother of all inflection points.

Such a moment cries out for bold, visionary and unprecedented transformation. The status quo is the one thing for sure we know does not work. Otherwise, we would not find ourselves in this moment.

It is in these moments that giant societal leaps forward are possible, and deeper, more cruel degradations will be sought, by some—note the corruption of our postal service.

Here in Milwaukie, we've been endeavoring to address our responsibilities around combating climate chaos for a few years now and that will continue unabated.

City Council has chosen to shift our third goal in order to meet this moment in addressing equity, one of the three cornerstones of the city's vision. We recognize that Black, Indigenous and people of color (BIPOC) have suffered horrific inequities and crimes against humanity, such as slavery, slaughter, rape, theft of land and property, medical experimentation, forced relocation, denial of basic human rights, and restriction from generational wealth building in this country for centuries.

We are focused on listening to the experiences of our BIPOC neighbors, and we are beginning to work with them, as well as other partners, to reimagine how a city can truly be effective at serving the needs of all its residents. All ideas will be considered. As I said at the beginning, this moment cries out for unprecedented transformation.

My hope is that everyone will engage honestly and humbly while recognizing the privilege that many of us have enjoyed all our lives to move our community forward in a powerful way. The lives of all our residents will be made better when the lives of our most marginalized neighbors are greatly improved.

Crime, homelessness, drug abuse and other ills, often suffered by our BIPOC friends at significantly higher rates, can be traced back to childhoods ravaged by pain, hunger and hopelessness caused by our inequitable society. We have the opportunity to short-circuit that cycle and lift all to a better life. We (our society) caused it. It is on us all, to fix it.

## Writing City Hall's Next Chapter



Milwaukie's current City Hall has served the community since 1938. Now, as the city plans to move to a newer building, City Council has appointed a City Hall Blue Ribbon Committee to help decide how the current city hall site should be used in the future.

The 12-member committee, along with Wilda Parks serving as a City Council liaison, held their first meeting in July. The committee has representation from the city's official Neighborhood District Associations, as well as its boards and committees. The charge of the committee is to learn about the city hall site, opportunities and constraints for future uses, review public engagement activities, and help define community goals for the future of the site.

At the first meeting the group discussed the project charter and ground rules, received a presentation on site history and discussed public engagement activities.

# City Council Adopts Full Update of the Comprehensive Plan Launching Code Update

Last month, City Council adopted a full update to the policies that make up the Comprehensive Plan, a feat that hasn't been done in more than 30 years. The update process took two and a half years to complete with countless volunteer and staff hours. Here is a brief summary of community engagement highlights:



- 24 meetings of the 15-member Comprehensive Plan Advisory Committee at which committee members offered guidance for policy development
- In-person outreach at Neighborhood District Associations (NDAs), canvassing at community concerts and Milwaukie Farmers Market
- Three town halls with more than 100 participants each, two open houses with more than participants each, all included simultaneous Spanish translation
- Four online open houses/surveys that corresponded with the in-person town halls (all were in English and Spanish)
- Three Spanish-language focus groups with more than 50 participants
- A wide variety of outreach methods, including Pilot newsletter articles, multiple website and social media, and numerous emails to the more than 500-person email list of interested community members
- Robust and engaging public hearings at both the Planning Commission and City Council

The adopted document is a complete update from the previous plan. Here are some highlights of the new document:

- A brand-new climate change and energy section to meet the city's climate action plan goals
- More policies addressing equity, housing affordability and natural resource protection—all guided by input from the Milwaukie community
- Updated data with infographics and maps
- Photos that highlight the beauty and energy of the city

With the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan, the community can celebrate a long and successful process, but adoption also signals the start of the work to implement the new policies. In September, the city will begin a year-long effort to update development code amendments focused on housing, residential parking and urban forestry. The city has selected a highly experienced consultant team led by Urbsworks, Inc. to assist in this effort. Staff, along with community members on the Comprehensive Plan Implementation Committee (CPIC), will need help from the community to prepare code amendments that meet the new goals and policies. Expect to see more town halls, surveys, focus groups and engagement opportunities over the next year to assist with this work. Events will follow any COVID-19 guidelines that may be in place and potentially virtual. Virtual participation options will also be a priority even once restrictions are lifted.

## Selling a Home? Don't Forget Your Home Energy Score



Starting Oct. 1, homes listed publicly for sale in Milwaukie are required to display a Home Energy Score (HES) Report as part of the Residential Energy Performance Rating and Disclosure Ordinance adopted by City Council in January 2020. These easy-to-read reports explain the energy efficiency of a home, helping homeowners and potential home buyers make more informed decisions.

Only homes listed and advertised publicly for sale are required to obtain a Home Energy Score assessment. Residents may qualify for low-income assistance or exemptions. Visit [www.milwaukieoregon.gov/sustainability](http://www.milwaukieoregon.gov/sustainability) to learn more about the program.

### Pellet Barbeque Safety

For those who regularly use a barbeque pellet stove for cookouts, these tips can help prevent fires and use the barbeque safely.

#### Ensure the barbeque pellet stove is functioning properly:

- Maintain the barbeque according to the manufacturer's specifications
- Check the heat shield for holes or warping
- Check the fire box for holes
- Keep it covered to limit rust, as well as wear and tear



#### Help prevent fires:

- Never leave barbeques unattended
- Keep barbeques away from structures.
- Clean out dry vegetation from under decks.
- Keep barbeques clean—do not allow grease to build up.

### Coming Soon: Temporary Utility Assistance Program

The city is partnering with St. Vincent DePaul to create a temporary utility assistance program. The program will begin with \$50,000 to support Milwaukie utility customers experiencing an emergency financial hardship, such as loss of income or unexpected and unusual expenses. Those eligible may receive up to \$400 or the equivalent of two utility payments, whichever is the lesser amount. St. Vincent DePaul will administer the temporary utility assistance program on behalf of the city, determining eligibility and distributing the funding.

The program is expected to begin later this month. Community members are welcome to donate additional funding to the program and a fixed monthly amount can also be arranged for those interested in making sustained contributions.

## LAKE ROAD

Over the past couple of years, several residents in the Lake Road neighborhood have watched the construction happening at the North Clackamas School District Technology & Information Services building at 4411 SE Lake Rd. There has been some confusion about the decision to spend funds (especially now during the COVID-19 pandemic) and the budget shortfalls in education that the district is facing. A few years ago, Lake Road was told that the school district had to buy the building on 12400 SE Freeman Way and remodel it to meet new requirements, stating it was more cost effective than trying to bring their old building at 4411 SE Lake Road up to modern office standards. A few years ago the school district's technology and information services department moved into that old building. A remodel was completed with new walls, ceilings, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, and computers. A significant amount of funds has been spent to bring the older building up to date, as well as adding more storage. A concrete slab for a backup generator, fencing and high voltage cables were installed two years ago. Now, a new location is being prepared for that generator, with another concrete slab, cabling

and fencing to move it about 150 feet from the original site. An additional expense, all while the community is facing educational budget cuts. How will this affect students? It would be good to hear an explanation about why this is necessary.

The September meeting will be held through Zoom, the online conferencing application. If you are interested in attending the meeting, it's a good idea to prepare. Visit the calendar on the city website at [www.milwaukieoregon.gov](http://www.milwaukieoregon.gov) to find the link to join the meeting, as well as helpful tips for those who haven't used Zoom before. The agenda will cover concerns regarding traffic on Lake Road and the tributary streets connected to it, and an update about the Lake Road reconstruction project. The neighborhood will also discuss grant requests from Milwaukie's Meals on Wheels, Clackamas Service Center and the Milwaukie Arts Committee's Porchfest. A vote on those grants will be held at the October meeting. In preparation for the upcoming election, Lake Road is offering all City Council candidates to join in the discussion this month and next.
