## New City Hall Building Opens to the Community on Friday, Sep. 15 at 8 a.m.

Following years of planning and construction, the city will transition into a new city hall building in mid-September. To accommodate the move, the current city hall building will close to the public on **Monday, Sep. 11 at noon**, followed by the Johnson Creek Facility, which will close on **Tuesday, Sep. 12 at noon**. During this time, in-person services at both the Johnson Creek Facility and the current city hall are closed, however, online services will not be disrupted and payments can still be made through the drop box. All in-person city services will reopen on **Friday, Sep. 15 at 8 a.m.** at the new building, located at 10501 SE Main St.

Please note, the first public meetings in the new city hall building are the City Council work and regular sessions on Oct. 3. Until then, meetings will continue at the current city hall building. This schedule is subject to change and more announcements will be made throughout September on the city's website and social media pages. Be sure to check back often for the latest information.

The city selected Henry Point Development to reimagine the historic city hall building. Redevelopment will preserve the building's façade, while updating the interior to host several tenants, including a brewery, restaurant, bakery and coffee shop, along with community art and office space. Construction is expected to begin in late 2023. ## Preserving Historic Homes and Buildings in Milwaukie

September is a big month in the history of Milwaukie. After 85 years, we will move into a new City Hall. It's a lovely facility, allowing us to have one location where residents and businesses can come for one-stop shopping in terms of city services, from parking passes to building permits.

It's bittersweet to leave behind our Historic City Hall, built in 1938 as a federal Public Works Administration project. You can read the

But the good news is that city staff did a great job ensuring that the historic exterior will be preserved while the building is repurposed to house a brewery, restaurant and bakery, along with community art and office space. Thus, our historic city hall will continue to be an important hub of our downtown.

The Historic City Hall might also become the only building in our downtown listed on the National Register of Historic Places, while many, such as the 1945 Victory Theater (now Wunderland) and the 1925 Masonic Lodge are eligible. Unfortunately, despite the fact that Milwaukie is one of the oldest settler communities in Oregon, not only are we lacking properties on the National Register, but even under our own code, we have very little recognition of or protections for historic buildings, because our code and inventory is nearly 35 years old!

What does this mean? For one thing, it means no midcentury homes in Milwaukie have been offered status under our code, despite the fact that metro-area tours of midcentury homes routinely include Milwaukie's fine examples on their tours. Architecture generally has to be 50 years old or more to be considered for historic listing, so only structures built before 1938 were eligible at the time our historic inventory was compiled.

Why preserve historic buildings? The reasons are many – just a few include that the reuse of an old building has the smallest carbon footprint, often results in a building more durable than more recent construction, and can add character or charm to a community, fostering a sense of place and prompting more investment. We are long overdue to update both our code and our inventory. I think the dissolution of the Design and Landmarks Committee (the final vote for which will be at our Sep. 5 meeting) is a mistake, and I hope that City Council will agree that the preservation work should be moved up higher in the Planning Department workplan for the coming years.

## Temporary Closures at Public Works Building

As part of the transition of city services, the Johnson Creek Facility at 6101 SE Johnson Creek Blvd. will undergo essential updates and improvements in mid to late September to accommodate public works staff moving into the building. During this time, the Johnson Creek Facility will temporarily close. Specific dates have not been determined yet, but will be communicated once they are known.

### Recent Fee Increases

In July 2023, City Council approved the fee schedule for fiscal year 2024 and some rates increased. Those include:

- **Residential wastewater:** increased 2.51% in monthly billing and administration fees.
- **SAFE and street fees:** increased by 4.58%.
- **Building permit fees:** increased by 2.5% in conjunction with the Consumer Price Index.
- **Downtown parking permits:** increased from \$90 per month to \$100 per month. Quarterly permits increased from \$250 to \$275.
- **Base fee for business registration:** increased from \$165 to \$175 per year.

Historic city hall was built in 1938 through the Public Works Administration, part of the New Deal programs. At one time, all city departments were located inside the building, including police and fire. Over the years, those departments relocated one by one as community services increased and staff outgrew the space. City services will return to a similar model with most city staff consolidating into the new city hall building in mid September.

## Harvey Street Improvement Project Updates



Despite staffing shortages that caused a delay, the city can now continue with the Harvey Street improvements project with Century West as the designer. This project will build a continuous sidewalk that meets Americans with Disabilities Act standards, make the road more bicycle friendly, replace underground pipes, slow down traffic, and repave the street. The project's scope of work also expanded to include repaving the street and completing some minor utility updates up SE 42<sup>nd</sup> Avenue and on some cul-de-sacs that branch off of both Harvey Street and 42<sup>nd</sup> Avenue.

In spring 2022, the city conducted a survey about the Harvey Street project, asking community members about how they use the corridor, what their on-street parking preferences would be and how they felt about including traffic calming features. Those responses shaped the final project design and features important to the community were included into it. ## Campfire Safety

Camping season is here, which means more and more people are outside building recreational and cooking fires. Clackamas Fire District #1 encourages everyone to follow these tips to help keep you and your family safe while enjoying campfires this summer.



- ◆ Before setting up a campfire, be sure it's permitted.
- ◆ Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves. Place rocks in a circle around your fire area.
- ◆ Keep campfires small and don't let them get out of hand.
- ◆ Keep plenty of water or a shovel and dirt/sand nearby to put out the fire. Make sure to completely put the fire out before leaving the site.
- ◆ Never leave campfires unattended.
- ◆ Don't let children or pets play near the fire.
- ◆ Don't let children add wood or debris to the fire.
- ◆ If your clothes catch on fire – stop, drop and roll while covering your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth until the fire is out.
- ◆ Treat burns right away. Cool the burn with cool water for three to four minutes. Cover with a clean, dry cloth and get medical help, if needed.
