Milwaukie City Council Declares Climate Emergency, Expedites Timelines for Climate Goals

In January 2020, Milwaukie City Council unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing the declaration of a climate emergency. This declaration reinforces Milwaukie's commitment to climate action, and highlights the importance of city-led actions called for in the climate action plan.

With the passage of the resolution, the city is expediting its climate goals by five years to reflect the need for immediate regional decarbonization. By 2030, Milwaukie aims to have net-zero emissions from electricity. By 2035, it aims to have net-zero emissions from all building fuel types, and, by 2045, a completely carbon-neutral community.

Efforts are underway to implement the 53 city-led actions found in the climate action plan, adopted in October 2018. The city is also expanding its urban forest program, has achieved 100% carbon-free electricity for city operations through PGE's Green Future Impact, and has incorporated climate action priorities into plans and processes, including Milwaukie's updated Comprehensive Plan.

By declaring a climate emergency, City Council will also receive more frequent updates and reevaluations of the climate action plan to help ensure city staff are continuously working on the most impactful city-led actions in an efficient manner. The city will also continue to work closely with its partners, including PGE and Energy Trust of Oregon, to offer programs and incentives that align with Milwaukie's climate goals.

City Council is calling on other jurisdictions to adopt similar resolutions, and to establish or adjust their climate goals to reflect the urgency needed to address the current climate crisis. They also hope all community members will be inspired by the climate emergency declaration, and implement priorities in the climate action plan into their own homes and businesses.

Relief from Idling Trains Coming Soon

Neighbors in the Island Station neighborhood have long suffered through big diesel locomotives idling nearby on a short line owned by Portland and Western Railroad (PNWR). Railroads are one of the most efficient ways to move freight, but they are hard on our health and climate. Sometimes, a row of four diesel locomotives will park behind

homes and pump out exhaust for hours. Toxic soot hangs in the air and collects on railings and windows. Often, the trains idle next to a small playground in Spring Park, while children frolic, and air quality suffers everywhere within a quarter mile.

When these idling events happen it's because there is a traffic jam farther up the line in the Brooklyn Rail Yard (1664 SE Holgate Blvd., Portland). Those tracks are owned by other railroad companies, and so the PNWR trains must wait for their turn to move through. These locomotives are old and, unlike a car, they can't just be turned off and on. It takes an hour or more to power the engines back up. The engineer only receives the signal to go ahead from the switchyard about fifteen minutes in advance, so the engines must stay on.

On its own, the city hasn't been able to do much about it. Railroads enjoy protected legal status. They are exempted from state laws that regulate toxic exhaust and from city ordinances. Even at the federal level, there is very little that can stop or control what a railroad does or does not do. It's up to the leadership of the railroad to make decisions that change the situation.

After years of complaints from neighbors and Willamette View residents, city efforts to negotiate improvements, work with DEQ, and a great deal of leadership from State Representative Karin Power, who built relationships with Genessee & Wyoming (PNWR's parent company)—relief is in sight. This spring, PNWR is installing Automatic Engine Stop/Start Systems (AESS) on six of the eight locomotives that run on the line. This will allow the engineer to rapidly shut down and restart the engines, reducing the need to idle. The city is working with Genessee & Wyoming to find funding to install AESS equipment on the last two locomotives.

This is great news for our residents and for our planet, and I am grateful for everyone's persistence in finding a solution. My biggest thanks goes to Jeff Van Schaick at Genessee & Wyoming, who heard our concerns and took them seriously. Perhaps Union Pacific's leadership can do the same and work to improve air quality in and around the Brooklyn Rail Yard!

MILWAUKIE WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

March is Women History Month and a time to reflect on the incredible impact women historically and currently have in the community. From Florence Ledding to Nell Martin to Agnus Shindler, Milwaukie women have played important and unique roles throughout the history of the city.

In recent years, naming just a few, June Rouston was instrumental in building Milwaukie's first library in 1965, as well as one of Milwaukie's first parks—Century Park—in the 1980s. Jean Baker elevated the comprehensive plan from being just a tool to a state law required in land use planning. Carolyn Tomei served as mayor from 1998-2000, and was the first female Milwaukian to hold House District Seat 41 from 2001-15. Enid Briggs has contributed countless hours preserving Milwaukie's past for future generations.

To honor these contributions and the role of women in both Milwaukie and the nation, which has been overlooked and undervalued, attend the March 3 City Council meeting at City Hall beginning at 6 p.m. for a Women's History Month proclamation from the Milwaukie Historical Society.

Join the Community Emergency Response Team



Are you interested in being better prepared to help yourself, family and community in the event of a disaster? If so, consider joining the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)! During an incident, emergency service personnel may not be able to reach everyone right away. By training with CERT, community

members will have the skills to help save lives and property. CERT teams are known and trusted resources to emergency responders and their community.

First-time volunteers are guided by trained instructors through a 25-hour FEMA course. CERT is a training program covering basic skills, including disaster fire suppression techniques, light search and rescue and first aid/triage, among many others. As part of a CERT team, members are called upon to respond to local disasters, participate in drills and exercises, and take additional training.

Milwaukie's CERT currently has 40 community volunteers, and ten FEMA certified CERT trainers, who are also members of the Clackamas Fire District Auxiliary Volunteer Association. Milwaukie CERT recruits year round and always has room for more volunteers. How to Properly Fit Bicycle Helmets

Clackamas Fire wants children and families to ride their bikes as much as possible and make sure they are safe while doing so. According to Safe Kids Worldwide, properly-fitted bike helmets can reduce the risk of head injuries by at least 45 percent, yet less than half of children 14 years old and younger wear a helmet.



Here are a few tips about how to fit a bike helmet:

- The helmet should sit level on the head and low on the forehead, about one or two finger-widths above the eyebrow. It shouldn't be tilted forward or backward.
- Center the buckle of the strap under the chin. On most helmets, the straps can be pulled from the back of the helmet to lengthen or shorten the chin straps.
- Buckle the chin strap. Tighten until it is snug, so no more than one or two fingers fit under the strap.
- Test the fit by opening the mouth wide, like a big yawn. The helmet should pull down on the head. If not, readjust for a good fit.

Floodplains: Not So Ordinary



The City of Milwaukie regulates floodplains through Milwaukie City Code Title 18. Floodplains are identified as the areas inundated by the February 1996 flood (shown on the Metro Water Quality and Flood Management Area maps), as well as the 1-percent-annual-chance flood, also known as 100-year flood (shown on the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Floodway Maps).

FEMA's 1-percent-annual-chance flood has a 1% likelihood of occurring or being exceeded each year. A 1% annual chance may seem small, but over the length of the average 30-year mortgage, a home in this floodplain has more than a 26% chance of being flooded at least once. Information about this flood was developed through a formal Flood Insurance Study (FIS). Milwaukie's latest FIS was developed through a countywide study effective in 2008. Although FEMA helped develop the map, this is Milwaukie's floodplain to manage.

While safety is primary in importance, the FEMA maps were also developed as a tool for providing flood insurance. Requiring floodplain building construction to meet minimum requirements allows Milwaukie residents to obtain flood insurance through the National Flood Insurance Program. In Milwaukie, the city goes above and beyond the minimum. This includes requiring the first floor of buildings to be elevated higher above the flood height, extending the regulated area beyond FEMA maps, and prohibiting net fill of materials within the floodplain. Through maintaining eligibility within the National Flood Insurance Program and promoting safer development, Milwaukie is making sure its residents are up a creek with at least two paddles.

Upcoming Tree and Shrub Pruning



Trees and shrubs are an important part of a vibrant, livable city. They provide many services and benefits to the community, but they need regular maintenance. Pruning is both an important health and safety measure.

While the responsibility for pruning shrubs and trees falls on property owners, city staff prune problem areas along the street to provide clearance for emergency vehicles, street sweepers, and other high clearance vehicles each March and October. Property owners are encouraged to do this themselves, as city staff prune for compliance, not aesthetics. Staff will begin pruning the **week of March 9**.

Clearance over streets and sidewalks is important for visibility, access and the proper functioning of street and stormwater systems. Milwaukie City Code (MMC 12.12.010) requires property owners to prune trees and shrubs over streets and sidewalks. Pruning should allow 12 feet of clearance over the street, and eight feet of clearance over the sidewalk. Shrubs should not encroach into the roadway or sidewalk.

Community Input Sought for 42nd Avenue SAFE Project



As part of the Milwaukie Safe Access for Everyone (SAFE) program, the city will make several improvements along SE 42nd Avenue, between Johnson Creek Boulevard and Harvey Street. This

work includes reconstructing portions of the sidewalk and ramps for ADA accessibility, adding bicycle markings, making water system improvements, and replacing a sewer pipe.

The city presented preliminary designs for the project at an open house in October 2019, where neighbors and other attendees provided helpful feedback. Based on the community input received, updates have been made to the project.

The community is encouraged to review the latest ideas for sidewalks and crosswalks, information about the city's approach moving forward, and, most importantly, provide feedback on what's being proposed. 
