Building Community in the Street

The City of Milwaukie recently approved the Neighborhood Intersection Painting Program, an initiative aimed at increasing community social capital within Milwaukie neighborhoods through the creation of street murals.

Why Painted Intersections?

Painted Intersections use art to bring people together. The shared objective of creating a street mural helps build relationships, empowers people to build public spaces, and encourages creative expression.

According to City Repair, a Portland Organization behind many of the painted intersections in Portland, "intersection art naturally elicits a sense of pride and identity for all that pass through" the neighborhood.

Painted intersections become shared community landmarks that serve to improve the overall quality of life in the community.





Sherrett Street Intersection Painting

In 2015 the Ardenwald– Johnson Creek
Neighborhood came together to create the
first painted intersection in Milwaukie. Located
at the intersection of Sherrett St. and 30th
Avenue on the border between Milwaukie and
Portland, the mural features a dogwood for
Milwaukie and a rose for Portland, along with
perimeter drawings representing different
facets of the community. The artwork is both a
way to celebrate within the neighborhood as
well as welcome newcomers.

How do I get a Painted Intersection in my Neighborhood?

In order to obtain the required Right of Way permit residents must complete the Right of Way Permit Application and include the following:

- 1. Completed Arts Committee (artMOB) Painted Intersection Design Review Application including artwork designs
- 2. Signed approval petition of 80% of all residents living within 400 feet of the chosen intersection.

Other considerations:

- Location Painted Intersections must be on "local" streets and not on designated Public Transit Routes as well as 5 feet from traffic control devices such as stop signs.
- Materials Intersections must be painted using approved traffic paint
- Maintenance Permit applicant(s) are responsible for future maintenance and repair of artwork paint.
