The City of Milwaukie is fortunate in many ways. Recycle TVs, Computers and Monitors for Free

Did you know that computers, monitors, TVs, printers and computer peripherals (keyboards, mice, etc.) can be recycled for free at more than 30 locations in Clackamas County? These types of electronic items contain toxic materials, such as lead, cadmium and mercury, and are banned from disposal in the garbage. However, through the Oregon E-Cycles program, up to seven items can be recycled for free at multiple locations around Milwaukie, including all Goodwill and Salvation Army locations, the Metro South Transfer Station 2001 Washington Street, Oregon City), and Far West Fibers (4930 SE 26th Avenue).


Oregon E-Cycles also allows households, small businesses and small nonprofits (10 staff or fewer) to recycle more than seven items at one time. Please call specific collection sites ahead of time to inquire about any verification needed and to be sure the collection site has the capacity to handle the items.

Each year since 2009, when the program was started, recycling goals have been exceeded. In 2015, more than 30 million pounds were recycled according to a Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) report.

Milwaukie's Annual Umbrella Parade & Tree Lighting Set for Dec. 3



Milwaukie's special holiday Umbrella Parade & Tree Lighting event will be held on **Saturday, Dec. 3 from 4-6 p.m.** Everyone is welcome to join in on the community's annual tradition of decorating umbrellas and parading through downtown, and celebrating the lighting of the tree in front of City Hall.

No pre-registration is required. Parade participants are only asked to convene at 4 p.m. at the Adams Street Connector, next to the Main St. light rail station. The parade will march at 4:15 p.m., travel four blocks north on Main Street, and end at the City Hall Sculpture Garden where the tree will be lit at 5 p.m. As part of the Umbrella Parade, judges from Milwaukie's Arts Committee will pick the best decorated umbrellas in three categories—Most creative, Most festive and Most Milwaukie. Prizes will be awarded to both adults and kids in each category during the tree lighting ceremony.

Word came from the North Pole that Santa Claus will make a special appearance, so don't forget those wish lists and cameras! Bob's Red Mill has graciously donated their delicious cookies, and hot chocolate will be provided, while supplies last.

To help make the season brighter for local families and children in need, the city encourages those coming to the event to bring a new, unwrapped toy to City Hall.

GETTING TO THE EVENT:

- **PARKING:** Please park on the street in downtown Milwaukie or use the public parking lot on Main Street across from City Hall, between Jackson and Harrison St. If you park in the lot, you will not be able to enter or exit between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. for the Tree Lighting event, which requires the closure of Main St. and, therefore, access in and out of the lot.
- **USE TRIMET:** Downtown Milwaukie has convenient bus services and Orange Line light rail. Info at trimet.org.
- **BIKE OR WALK:** Find resources at milwaukieoregon.gov.

FREE LEAF DROP

The community is invited to dispose of leaves for free at the city's Public Works Yard at **6101 SE Johnson Creek Blvd. from 7 AM to 2 PM on Saturdays from Nov. 5 - Dec. 17.** This service is limited to those living within city limits. To participate, please provide a utility bill (e-bill or paper bill) as proof of residency. Participants are responsible for emptying their own leaves into the receptacles. Those dropping off leaves are encouraged to donate non-perishable food items to help local families in need.

Fall & Winter Street Sweeping



Milwaukie's Streets Division of Public Works continuously strives to maintain the city's roads and provide safe traveling conditions for pedestrians, bicyclists and vehicles. Regular sweepings also protect the water quality of local streams, rivers and creeks. During the fall and winter months, the community is asked to refrain from sweeping leaves into the street for pick-up. Street sweepers frequently address known trouble areas throughout the city, and are available to address other issues that arise from leaves and debris. To report a trouble area, call 503-786-7687.

Neighbors can assist street sweepers by keeping the roadway in front of their homes free of large objects and obstructions. This includes cars, trucks, boat trailers, RVs, and basketball hoops. These items commonly keep the sweeper from reaching the curb lane where debris often accumulates. Keeping trees and shrubs pruned back to at least 12 feet from the roadway and 8 feet over the sidewalks also allows the sweeper to reach more areas and not break off limbs, which add debris back into the street.

MILWAUKIE BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT



Congratulations to Bob Moore, founder of Bob's Red Mill, who won the 2016 Golden Spurtle World Porridge Championship, the prize awarded for the best traditional porridge in the world, in Carrbridge, Scotland last month. Bob's Red Mill won the Golden Spurtle just once before in 2009. This was Bob's first trip to see the Golden Spurtle in Scotland, the birthplace of oatmeal, and first time competing in a cooking competition. Bob spent the last six months practicing his basic porridge skills and creating a special dish consisting of oatmeal with lemon marmalade and crumbled Walker's Shortbread. Winning the Golden Spurtle is a testament to the quality of oats and the cooking method—competitors can only use pinhead (also known as steel cut) oats, salt and water to prepare the porridge.

Headquartered at 13521 SE Pheasant Ct., Bob's Red Mill was founded in Milwaukie in 1978. They offer free tours to the community, which highlights their unique stone-grinding process. Tours generally last about 75 minutes, and everyone leaves with a free sample. For more information and recipe for the award-winning porridge, visit www.bobsredmill.com.

It was great to see so many at the October neighborhood meeting! Officer Dan Cloyes continued the Milwaukie Police Department's extensive outreach to educate the community about the existing ordinances regulating bicycles, skate boards, and other alternative modes of transportation in the downtown and commercial areas. To view zoning maps, visit milwaukieoregon.gov/GIS. Support was voiced for active modes of transportation when the participants respect the safety of others and refrain from damaging property.

The majority of the meeting was dedicated to the visioning process, which is also part of redrawing the blue print for the city, also known as the Comprehensive Plan. The current Comprehensive Plan was adopted back in the day when light rail was proposed to turn east on Monroe towards Happy Valley. The present day zoning still reflects this dated concept. If you live in the R2 zone, three story buildings are allowed without a hearing, and an additional story is allowed with a 10 percent increase in the vegetated area. Check zoning at milwaukieoregon.gov/GIS.

This fall, the Adopt-A-Road event is scheduled for Saturday, Nov. 12 at 9 a.m. Please plan to meet at the main entrance of Linwood Elementary for light snacks and beverages. The city will provide gloves, tongs, bags, and safety vests. The goal is to divide into small groups to cover the entire length of Linwood Avenue, from Harmony Road north to King Road. During the last clean-up on Linwood Avenue, it took volunteers until about 11 a.m. to complete the walk and consolidate the bags of debris for the city to pick up

The Linwood neighborhood recognizes that there are a lot of concerns regarding walkability and safety along neighborhood streets. Please do your part to help maintain safe travel by clearing-out clogged or covered storm drains around your home. It doesn't take many leaves over a storm grate to obstruct flow. Flooded streets and the inability to brake can make a routine trip to the store dangerous. Please remember that the speed limits in the neighborhoods are there to suggest speed when visibility is at its best. In the case of rain and short days, it is good to remember to slow down according to the existing conditions. Parents and kids are still trying to get to school safely on these days, and some families don't have the option to ride the bus on especially rainy days if they live within one mile of their school.
