



Ann Ober Becomes Milwaukie's New City Manager, Starts Mid-October



Ann Ober

Last month, Ann Ober was officially selected as Milwaukie's new City Manager. Her first day will be Monday, Oct. 17, which coincides with current City Manager Bill Monahan's last day, who is set to retire. Ober was chosen after a comprehensive interview process that included interview panels with City Council, the city's senior management team, and community volunteers from Milwaukie's boards and commissions.

Most recently, Ober was serving as the Regional Policy and Energy Director for Park City, Utah, as well as the Chair of the Governance Committee for Millcreek, a new city on the verge of incorporation. Prior to her work in Park City, she was the Public Services Administrative Division Director for Salt Lake City, and both the Government Affairs and Policy Director, and Environmental Policy Coordinator for Salt Lake County. Ober holds a Master's degree in Public Administration from the University of Utah, and a Bachelor of Arts in Communication from Pacific Lutheran University.

Ober is currently relocating her husband, Steve, and three-year-old daughter, Ally, to Milwaukie. Her husband has also received an employment offer in the area. Ober's first official public meeting will be the Oct. 18 City Council meeting.

City Council Proposes New Fee For Improvements to Pedestrian & Bicycle Safety



In order to make required improvements to Milwaukie's sidewalks and ramps, and bring the community into compliance with federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards, the city is proposing a monthly Safe Access For Everyone (SAFE) charge to fund the mandatory enhancements. To learn more about how the SAFE charge will affect monthly utility bills, attend a special informative public forum with Mayor Gamba and city staff on **Monday, Oct. 10 from 4 to 7 p.m. at the Public Safety Building (3200 SE Harrison Street).**

The SAFE charge will be based on the average number of trips per unit a property typically generates. The Citizens Utility Advisory Board is recommending a \$0.46 per trip fee. The trips per unit are determined by the property type and use— for commercial properties, a unit is typically related to the size of the building. In Milwaukie, a unit is 1,000 square feet. For residential properties, the units are typically per dwelling. For example, a single family home would be one unit, but a complex of four apartments would be four units.

About 47 percent of the revenues from the proposed SAFE charge will come from residential customers, with the remaining 53 percent from commercial/industrial customers. The planned improvements benefit both commercial/industrial and residential properties.

City Council will consider adopting this fee at its Nov. 1 meeting. Participation in City Government

It's with great pride that I write this month's Councilor Corner. I'm now in my tenth year of service to the citizens of Milwaukie; six and a half years as an appointed Planning Commissioner and, in December, four years as an elected City Councilor. That honor and duty as an elected official I do not take lightly. It's a position that represents the citizens and tax payers of Milwaukie. I ran on two

primary issues—the importance of Government Transparency and Financial Responsibility. The trust given to Councilors to act responsibly with our city's precious tax dollars is key to a balanced and sustainable future and city budget. This is the very foundation of our democracy—to have city officials which we elected make decisions that will demonstrate a responsible use of city funds. That said, there are times when we know that our citizens need to step forward and vote on major issues. These major issues cannot be left in the hands of just a few appointed or elected officials. Major issues, such as Light Rail or the Ledding Library Expansion. For Light Rail, a previous City Council in 2008 approved \$5 million for Milwaukie's share of the cost of the \$1.49 billion project, but without a funding source. Citizens stepped forward to pass a bond to make sure city services weren't reduced. For the Ledding Library Expansion, our Council was more transparent and direct. The project request was made clear and the \$9.2 million bond was passed.

So when an initiative such as Urban Renewal for Milwaukie with a valuation of \$120 million is put forward with “no direct new taxes”, transparency is questioned. Many citizens have reminded us that there is “no free lunch” and that “this forces other taxing agencies to put forward larger bond measures in the future.” To those who raised these concerns, I do not disagree, but the majority of Council chose to not let the citizens vote on the issue. The Council made the decision for them. As our Council President Lisa Batey pointed out in a recent article “Urban Renewal is a complicated mechanism...”

As I complete my term on City Council, I am reminded of the importance of citizen participation in city government. To be sure your point of view is considered, you must step forward and make sure your voice is heard by attending council meetings or signing petitions supporting your position. You must take up major “complicated issues” and make them transparent and allow citizens to participate in our essential democratic process—the right to vote—especially on major projects that ultimately affect our taxes.

City Recorder Pat DuVal Retires After 30 Years

After more than three decades of service to the City of Milwaukie, City Recorder Pat DuVal will retire at the end of October. In her 32-year career, she worked with nine Mayors, more than 30 City Councilors and six City Managers.

As the city's Election Official, Clerk of the Council, and Director of the City's Records and Information Management Department, she has been charged with preserving Milwaukie's history, and caring for City Council's detailed records. DuVal also has a vast institutional memory that she plans on sharing with staff before she departs.

DuVal was born and raised in Illinois, where she graduated from the University of Illinois at Champaign and began her professional career as a book buyer in Chicago. By the early 1980's, she relocated to Oregon, and soon found herself living and working in Milwaukie. Originally hired as Council Clerk, she was promoted to City Recorder in 1991 and has held the position ever since. In 2010, she was also asked to serve as interim City Manager.

When DuVal started her career with the city in December 1984, minutes were taken by hand and transcribed on a typewriter. Today, thanks to her leadership and foresight, Milwaukie is a long-standing member of Oregon Records Management Solution (ORMS), a unique public-private partnership that administers an electronic records management system according to the State's administrative rules.

DuVal is one of the longest serving City Recorders in Milwaukie history, and the city is incredibly grateful for her years of commitment to the community. She has made many lasting contributions to the city, and we look forward to her continued presence in the community.

Keeping Catch Basins Clean



Catch basins, or storm drains, are curbside drains with the sole function of collecting rainwater from properties and streets. In most counties and cities, Milwaukie included, that water never goes to the sewer treatment plant to be cleaned, flowing directly into creeks, rivers, sloughs and bay.

Cleaning catch basins helps maintains good flow through the stormwater system and prevent flooding. The community can help keep catch basins clear of debris by disposing of leaves and other yard waste properly. If a catch basin is full or is not draining after a rain event, it may be covered with leaves or road debris that needs to be removed. If the catch basin is not blocked and still not draining, call the city's storm division at 503-786-7687.

Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery, located on SE 17th Avenue next to Waverly Country Club, is commonly known as the oldest graveyard in town. Started in 1850 and donated to the city in 1869 by the Meek and Eddy families, it boasts some of the most famous Milwaukians in history. One of these plots is the final resting place of Captain Frederick Morse.

Captain Morse's grave marker is one of the first in Milwaukie and bears an inscription recounting the legend of his death on Christmas Day 1850. While celebrating the launch of the steamship Lot Whitcomb, he was struck by a fragment of a cannon, which exploded when fired. He is known as the only captain to have "gone down with their ship" on the Willamette River.

As legends go, when the Christmas ships pass in front of Milwaukie Bay, to this day, you can hear cannon fire near Elk Rock Island. It is said to be the ghost of Captain Morse, still following his celebration duties.

Jeff and Chris Davis, creators of The Davis Graveyard, along with their talented build crew, have operated the popular outdoor Halloween display at their Milwaukie home for more than 18 years. As one of the nation's largest and most detailed cemetery-themed yard haunts, the Davis Graveyard has won many awards, featured in several magazines, local newspapers and news channels, and was showcased in FearNet.com's "Haunts Across America" television series. The Davis Graveyard crew was even tapped to help with ABC's "Extreme Home Makeover" of Nightmare Factory in Salem, where they created cinderblock walls, aged brick hallways and carved scenic pieces from foam.

Now in its sixteenth year, Jeff and Chris coordinate the Home Haunters Video Awards. Videos submitted by Home Haunters from across the world are judged, submissions in several categories are awarded, and the videos are compiled into a DVD Set for sale. Sharing their prop building techniques, they offer summer seminars and teach local workshops at their home shop. The Davis' volunteer as hands-on workshop coordinators for HAuNTcon, as well as serve on the board of directors and volunteer to run the West Coast Haunters Convention.



Have you heard about SAFE—Safe Access for Everyone? This is a proposed new charge on your utility bill. The purpose is to generate funds to install sidewalks, ADA access ramps and bicycle transit lanes. Milwaukie is in a critical period to create and improve infrastructure to allow safe access for school children and other vulnerable residents—it cannot be delayed. There is a federal mandate for cities to create these safety corridors in the next few years. If you have questions about this new charge, please attend the Oct. 18 City Council meeting. There will be more information and time for public discussion about this very important program.

Speaking of safety, please avoid distractions while driving! Recently, a car on Lake Road was witnessed making a right turn onto SE Oatfield Road in front of children on bicycles, placing them in grave danger. There has been a substantial increase in accidents involving distracted driving this past year. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, drivers who use hand-held devices are four times as likely to get into serious crashes. A recent AAA survey also concluded that in a 30-day period, 70 percent of drivers talked on their cell phone while driving, and 20 percent read texts or emails while in traffic. Please put the cell phone down and keep your eyes on the road!



