




# Sunday Parkways Festivities Roll Into Milwaukie on Oct. 2



Sunday Parkways is coming to Milwaukie on **Sunday, Oct. 2 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.** This event will open city streets and public spaces to encourage people to walk, bike and roll through the community, interact with neighbors, visit local businesses, and connect with the city. Sunday Parkways events are free and open to the entire community.


The 8.5 mile route includes Water Tower Park, the downtown area, including Milwaukie Farmers Market and Milwaukie Business District, as well as Westmoreland and Sellwood. During the family-friendly event, city streets along the route are closed, which allow participants to easily and safely navigate through the community. Volunteer traffic coordinators will be staged along the route to ensure local residents still have access in and out of their home during the event.

Along the route, community partners, businesses, musicians and other entertainers set up, creating a festival-like atmosphere. More than 100 vendors have already registered to set up along the route with prizes, giveaways, and products for purchase.

In Milwaukie, two main activity areas will be staged at City Hall and SE 40th Avenue and Harvey Street with live music, beer garden, bouncy houses, games and other family-friendly, fun events.

An event of this size is only made possible by the generosity of volunteers. Volunteers are needed along the Milwaukie Sellwood route to help coordinate traffic at route intersections, provide mechanical support for participants' bicycles, patrol the route to be on the look out for any issues, and staff information booths. Sunday Parkways promotes healthy active living through a series of free events opening some of the region's largest public spaces. ## Keep Milwaukie Moving Forward

My wife and I recently bought our first house in Milwaukie after years of renting in town. The Quincy Addition plat in our Lake Road neighborhood is one of the earlier street grids in the city, dating back to 1907. Our residential streets seemed unusually wide, so when I looked up the original plat details, we were fascinated to find that the streets were intentionally planned that way in 1907 in order to provide room for future street car lines.

Nearly 110 years later, there is renewed development interest in our city. I'm excited that Council has passed an urban renewal plan that will allow the city to reinvest in business and economic development alongside other long-requested projects, like our south downtown plaza. However, Milwaukie, like our neighboring suburbs, has long since built out its residential areas. Our regional housing and rental markets continue to be tight, and, unfortunately, that's meant that some great volunteers on our boards and committees have had to leave the city. It's made me think long and hard about how Milwaukie can also make room for the different types of housing that people need and can afford throughout their lives.

I don't know if any street car lines in Quincy Addition were ever actually built. But that's how cities and towns have always developed, as leaders try to look into the future and accommodate and plan for the changes they think will come down the road. Milwaukie may have long been a hidden gem of a suburb, but I think we can all agree—our secret is out. So as the city embarks upon its next comprehensive plan update and vision process in the coming months, I hope we also consider what kinds of housing, transportation, and other changes we need to make in the future, so Milwaukie continues to be the welcoming, stable, and tight-knit community that we love today.

## September Artist Series: Orange is the New Milwaukie



September's selected artist for the City Hall Gallery is native Milwaukian Chris Haberman. September marks the one year anniversary of the MAX Orange Line opening, and the one year anniversary of Haberman's mural (*photo above*), the first public mural for Milwaukie. In a series of art pieces, the show celebrates Milwaukie itself—characters and iconic places, artwork along the MAX track, and historical elements of Milwaukie's past and present—all in Haberman's signature style. And, yes, all the art will be orange.

Haberman is a working painter, writer, muralist, curator and musician, native to Milwaukie. He graduated from Milwaukie High School in 1991, as did his mother in 1953. Aside from painting, Haberman has published award-winning poetry, journalism and fiction, and is also a lifetime member of the Academy of American Poets. He is well-known in the Portland region, showing art in hundreds of venues and working as the Art Consultant for the television series *Portlandia*.

A special Artist's Reception will be held on **Sep. 2 from 5 to 7 p.m. during First Friday** to kick off the show and provide a chance to meet with Haberman in person. ## Construction Update: 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue Multi-Use Path

Construction on the 17th Avenue Multi-Use Path continues to progress as planned and on schedule. The contractors recently finished pouring the ADA sidewalk ramps on Lava Drive, as well as the bus pad. The retaining wall next to the Milwaukie Pioneer Cemetery was also recently completed. Currently, crews are working on storm line improvements and finishing up the pavement grinding in the southbound lane of 17th Avenue.

In the next few weeks, 17th Avenue will receive a new asphalt overlay, restriping to include on-street bike lanes, and improved landscaping. Lane closures are still in place for this project and traffic delays are expected. Motorists are encouraged to take alternate routes where possible.

Once complete, the project will provide improved bicycle and pedestrian connections from the Trolley Trail to the Springwater Corridor. ## Water Tower Improvements Currently Underway

The water tower at 9890 SE 40th Ave. is currently undergoing needed improvements and maintenance to ensure the life of this critical piece of the city's drinking water system. Crews recently completed pressure washing the tank, and have begun grinding and sanding the corroded areas on the top and sides of the tank (*see photo below*). They're also continuing to pressure wash underneath the tank and catwalks. As part of the regularly scheduled maintenance, the water tower received a more reliable electrical power station as well, which has already been put into use. Once this work is complete, crews will begin additional repairs, which include welding certain areas on and around the tank.

Phase 1 of this project is expected to be complete by Sep. 30. Phase 2, consisting of improvements to the interior of the tank will begin mid-November.

## Stormdrain Cleaning Assistance Program



Are you a business property owner? While public stormdrains are maintained by public works, owners are responsible for cleaning their privately-owned stormdrains to keep the dirt and debris that carry pollutants from entering the public stormwater system, which includes Kellogg and Johnson Creeks, as well as the Willamette River. To help mitigate the costs associated with keeping these drains clean, the city created the Stormdrain Cleaning Assistance Program (SCAP). Through a competitive negotiation process with regional service providers, the program is able to provide catch basin cleaning for just \$45 each. Typically, the charge for this service averages about \$130 for one drain.

Keeping private stormwater drains clean prevents flooding and lowers the risk of property damage. # The History Behind Your Neighborhood's Name

Milwaukie is divided into seven neighborhood district associations (NDA)—Ardenwald-Johnson Creek, Hector Campbell, Historic Milwaukie, Island Station, Lake Road, Lewelling, and Linwood. Have you ever heard how they received their names?

## Ardenwald-Johnson Creek

In the late 1800's, Reverend George A. Rockwood purchased the area between SE 32nd Avenue and the railroad tracks, imagining it filled with wealthy homes, such as the one across from Ardenwald School. The neighborhood was named after his son, Arden, combined with the German word for woods—wald.

## Hector Campbell

Hector Campbell was Milwaukie's first school teacher. In 1849, he ventured west and staked his land claim near the area of SE Harrison Street and 42nd Avenue. He also was the first Clackamas County Judge, justice of the peace, and a delegate to the Constitution Convention in Salem in 1858.

## Historical Milwaukie

Inside this neighborhood, which includes all of downtown, are the remnants of Milwaukie's beginnings. The foundation of the city ranges from Milwaukie Bay to SE 21st Avenue, and Harrison Street to Washington Street.

## Island Station

The Interurban Trolley Line ran through Milwaukie from the 1880's till the 1950's on what is now known as the Trolley Trail. One stop was called Island Station, which was underneath the railroad bridge crossing over McLoughlin.

## Lake Road

Named after Lake Road, the road most farmers coming from the east used to get their products to market, that stretches along Kellogg Lake, which was much larger than today.

## Lewelling

Named for Seth Lewelling, who was a horticulturalist and political activist. He arrived in 1850 and started his fruit orchards. Almost all of the fruit trees in the west were started in Lewelling's orchards, and he created the Bing cherry. He is also known for creating the Oregon State Fair and helping draft the Initiative and Referendum Laws.

## Linwood

To be honest, nobody knows. It could be named for the linden trees in the neighborhood, or simply because a developer liked it. Inside the neighborhood, at the Milwaukie Covenant Church, is a stained glass window donated by President Herbert Hoover, whose uncle was Dr. Henry Minthorn, one of the first to plot the land as a neighborhood.

## Community Clean-Up Day Sep. 17



On **Saturday, Sep. 17**, the community is invited to dispose of unwanted bulky waste items. Community members living within the city limits of Milwaukie may set out a variety of items, along with their household bins, by **no later than 6 a.m.** to be picked up by their local garbage hauler.

The volume should be no more than the equivalent of five garbage bins. Smaller items should be bagged or placed directly in household bins, however, the **bins should not weigh more than 60 pounds**. A number of items cannot be picked up during this event, such as paint, car batteries, roofing/construction materials, propane tanks, or other hazardous materials.

A new business specializing in happy-making has set up in Milwaukie Riverfront Park, helping the community get involved with the up-and-coming sport of standup paddleboarding (SUP). Cascadia SUP offers a spectrum of experiences and coaching, from the beginner level to paddlers looking to develop themselves into SUP racers. Started by longtime surfer and paddlesport (primarily kayaking and canoeing) coach Jeff Briley, he's created a local program with the mission of fostering relationships with students to have fun, feel safe and leave with a smile on their faces, rather than focusing on numbers.
