





Workshop and Online Survey Results: **Downtown**

Past participation in planning and age








Most neighborhoods were well-represented with the exception of Lewelling. Some non-residents took the online survey.


Where do you live?





Eighty percent of respondents shop downtown and very few live or work downtown.


How do you use downtown?





Most believe development should happen across downtown, but over a quarter think South Downtown is the top priority.


We should prioritize development in...





Main Street is seen as highest priority for a single street, but 45% of respondents see all streets as equally important.


We should prioritize development in...





New residential development is seen as important in every area of downtown.


Having more places to LIVE would be desirable in...





New employment also seen as important in all areas of downtown.


Having more places to WORK would be desirable in...



Actually, it's the streetscaping altogether -- furniture, bollards, landscaping, as well as the quality facade materials.



Only downside here is no use of sidewalk -- needs benches, tables.


Not the right feel or fit for Milwaukie. Too industrial (how ironic!)

Not enough parking


It's not terrible, but not what I'd like to see in Milwaukie.

I think the materials and articulation/details could be better. A little bland, like some of what has gone in in Sellwood/Westmoreland in the past five years.



i love the open triangle of space - a good gathering spot, provides walkability!









Workshop and Online Survey Results: Central Milwaukie

Past planning participation and age








All neighborhoods represented except Lewelling, with a higher turnout of non-residents at the workshop than downtown.


Where do you live?





Most (65%) shop in Central Milwaukie, but 17% did not use Central Milwaukie at all.


How do you use Central Milwaukie?





More retail variety, new businesses, and housing are the top priorities.


What is the highest priority for Central Milwaukie?





Single-family and mixed-use housing compete for most needed housing. Multi-family and senior housing were least popular.


What type of housing is needed in Central Milwaukie?





Retail and medical jobs are seen as needed, likely reflecting opportunities to build upon the current development context.


What type of jobs are needed in Central Milwaukie?





Restaurants and retail have highest levels of support, while affordable housing was opposed by almost half of respondents


Would you support or oppose this type of development in Central Milwaukie?*

Most think that attractive, high-quality development is top priority for Murphy site, even if market cannot support it


What is the most important goal for the Murphy site?





Almost 60% of respondents would like to see a mix of uses on the Murphy site.


What would you like to see develop on the Murphy site?





Respondents also want high-quality development on McFarland site, but see higher need for job creation


What is the most important goal for the McFarland site?





A mix of uses also important, but 20% of respondents would like to see light industrial/flex space on the McFarland site


What would you like to see develop on the McFarland site?






Visions for Central Milwaukie are diverse, potentially reflecting the desire for a wide mix of uses

Two- to three-story buildings with ample landscaping are seen as most appropriate for Central Milwaukie








