III. REPORTS

A. Clackamas County Fire Report Jack Tanz

-During the month of May, the Fire District had a total monthly call volume of 2,562. This continues to demonstrate

—an increase in year to date when comparing to previous years. At the 1/2 way mark for the calendar year, there are over 1000 more incidents than this time last year. All types of incidents are seeing an increase but the primary area is EMS calls.

-over the life of the new levy the district is expecting to increase staffing bay 65 persons -Due to the success of the recent partial coverage of Sandy, as of July 1st, Clackamas will be a full service for Sandy

-For Grilling and BBQ please keep safety. In mind.

- Backyard burning is officially closed until the fall.
- Be aware of increasing fire danger levels as we enter summer and see continued dry weather.

• This month the Fire District safety focus is on grilling/BBQ safety, firework safety, and defensible space:

o Grilling/BBQ Safety: Only use them outside, keep well away from combustibles, keep clean of grease and fat build up, and never leave unattended.

Firework safety: Fireworks will go on sale in late June. Only use legal fireworks and encourage safe practices when using them (don't hold, distance from combustibles, etc.). "Be prepared, be responsible, be safe, and be aware". There are numerous commercial fireworks displays around the Fire District that are a great alternative to doing your own. (only use for the first part of July)

o Defensible Space: Encourage defensible space from homes for wildfire protection and prevention. Keep larger trees and shrubs away from the home, keep grasses/brush cut low, and check your roof for combustible building of debris.

• first fire happened in March just east of Sandy

B. Milwaukie Police Report — Tony Cereghino (new Administrative Police Captain)

• 4th of July is a restricted day off—all staffing will be out patrolling looking for firework violations

•Code enforcement will also be out the week before the fourth as well

•City limits are boundary for code enforcement for new firework laws—plan to educate •If the fireworks letting off fireworks that relatively safe please call non emergency number (503)786-7500—If it is a real emergency please do call 911; if it is in un-incorporated Clackamas county can also call county—(503) 655-8211

•3 recruits have just started the police academy

•2 new hires in the police department (1 which is a lateral recruit-Carl Dorman-from Dallas Oregon ; 1 is a new recruit (James Smith)who will new able to begin Acadamy in November)

•Milwaukie police participates in the interagency police exercises—3 of the local police officers have received accommodations from the sheriff's office for the work they have been doing for saving a life in a crisis situation.

•Katherine Myers has become a lead regional expert in the field of child trafficking.

Currently she is getting extra clearance through FBI. Will give her more opportunity to take these child trafficking to state office, as well as opening up resources to crime labs.

•in last couple weeks a fellow fled from a vehicle and jumped off the rocks into the river, and marine patrol from Clackamas county was able to take him into custody with U.S. Marshal •Body cameras are now a required and active part of the milwaukie police transparency

•depending on the crime with body-camera footage it is kept for different time depending on the severity of the crime—no crime will be available for 5 years—shooting or other serious crimes are kept for 100 years

•Dedicated personal to manage the footage which is kept on a secure cloud server

•Policy stipulates that administration is allowed access to body cam footage, but generally the officers are not allowed access to other officers' footage

•since drugs have been made more legal, there has been an uptick in violent crimes (the last decade has seen a large increase in mental health and drug abuse which appear to go hand in hand)

C. Capital Improvement Plan Projects-Jennifer Garbely

•just got proposals in for Harvey St—from 32nd -42nd along Harvey as well as some private inlay—going for award in July (usually takes consultants 1 year)—bundled with multiple utilities

•Monroe Greenway is starting to make progress—got proposals in from 37th all the way to Linwood (likely will be a 2 year design period, for ODOT acquisition and right of way)

•King road is underway from 40th area to Linwood-30% design

•Washington project (37th-Edison/ possibly out to 27th depending on how expensive project is) has a period that will cross over to next Sumer as it is awarded in August

•Waste water program has been running in Kent st, 37th, Washington, opens trenched work with new pipe from manhole to manhole—old pipe needing to be repaired.

•in July there will be one more crew that will come out to work on Home (no need to tear up any new construction)

•Ardenwald North is going to be back on focus hopefully out to bid in late summer

•North face from Murphy site near Meek St and travels the Railroad to Roswell—stormwater system has been updated

•Grinding Inlay project is going out to bid with 2"grind Jackson, Harrison, Lewelling, 44thhome, from Johnson creek to Roswell, 44th-Harrison; 58th at Johnson creek—Likely going out to bid in 3 weeks

•people will have 2-3 weeks heads up for specific 2 day period when grinding and Inlay to happen

•SE 22nd and River Road now has a new sign—will there be an effort to track the traffic to see if any change has been made?—

•TSP advisory meeting will be a couple month out (leadership will begin meeting in July) •

D. NDA Concerns PSAC Members Ardenwald—No current concerns

<u>Island Station</u>-• 22nd and wren heading south—would like to request a stop sign •request to have a service request (traffic device request form) put in to have an analysis of the intersection

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<u>Lake Rd</u>—school traffic on Boss and 37th by Rowe Middle school has been a major concern; Hoping to have a study to evaluate the safety concern—School might be able to reach out to the local church to see if the use of the parking lot is available for pick and drop off parking

Lewelling-

<u>Linwood</u>—No current concerns;

<u>Hector Cambell</u>—Intersection of Washington on 37th (what will the intersection look like? With signage and bike safety) — will be connected to the east side of Washington and 37th and Monroe greenway project—Developer may only complete the west side of that intersection—that is where the cycle track ends so there will need to be something that is finished by end of Monroe project

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E. Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan (7-7:30PM) Dan Harris

• FEMA requires through emergency management, updates the Hazard Mitigation Plan every 5 years—Main practical reason for this is to apply for funding when there are action items (such as seismic evaluations—And under grounding for potential issues)

•Draft version for the Natural hazard Mitigation plan is currently under review

•6 goals that are laid out by the county and 10 disaster areas by the county

•Even though Milwaukie doesn't have that many natural areas wildfire can also be air quality impact—However it is very unlikely that structure to structure fires running into tall grasses in Milwaukie

•River Rain Pluvial flooding (sandy river) this will effect the city of Milwaukie-we do not

need to have a flooding river to have local impact

•If a Hazard is not 1 of the 10 listed

•Kellogg Dam removal is called out as part of Flooding Mitigation

•Under-grounding of power lines tends to be more focused on critical facilities such as

Hospital etc to be able to coordinate recovery and light operations

•List of facilities and mass shelter sites that have not made the list would be welcome to add to the list of action items

•Some items from 2019 that have been completed will be removed from list (ie. NH2 satellite phone connection has been addressed)

•Hazard Vulnerability assessment Matrix (historical severity, Maximum severity;

Historically happened in Milwaukie—pg 27 of current plan)

•as a Nationwide way of assessing potential history or vulnerability, ranking has to be shifted from federal standards so that it makes sense locally

•County frames assessment as Worst Possible Impact of Natural Disaster

•Looking very locally at Milwaukie impact—Most vulnerabilities are not as extreme as they might be due to the type of building structures, etc.

Transportation System Plan Updates

During FY 23 and FY 24, planning and engineering have budgeted for and are preparing for a revision/rewrite of our Transportation System Plan (TSP). The TSP has not been through a major revision since 2013. During the 2022-2024 revision/rewrite of the TSP, PSAC will provide an active role in its capacity as an advisory committee on public safety(representing all neighborhoods within the city). The committee will collaborate with city staff, community members, our neighborhood district associations (NDAs), businesses, and other stakeholders. PSAC recently nominated two of its representatives to serve as liaisons between our committee and the Transportation System Plan (TSP) advisory committee. These representatives will facilitate communication and collaboration between the two committees, ensuring that public safety considerations are effectively integrated into the transportation planning process.

Continued/Ongoing

Disaster Preparedness

PSAC will work with CERT, Milwaukie Police, Clackamas Fire, and the City Emergency Management Coordinator to determine what the public should expect from these entities and how they can provide support to their community during an emergency. PSAC has a unique position that allows great communication between the City of Milwaukie, the NDAs, and the public. PSAC members will use this position to:

- Increase awareness of emergency protocols and evacuation orders
- Increase awareness of what can be expected of all city services during an emergency
- Provide education about CERT
- Work with the City's Emergency Operations Manager (EOM)
 - Aid in the development and community awareness of key Emergency and Disaster Planning Resources and Procedures
 - Provide feedback and act as a bridge between the City's EOM and the NDAs
- Encourage each NDA to have their own Disaster Preparedness committee and cache of supplies
- Assist with CERT membership advocacy
- Provide public education on general disaster preparedness that the public can do at home through communication with NDAs and by participating in public outreach opportunities such as booths ad applicable public events and public-speaking opportunities with designated city personnel

PSAC will work to maintain the strong relationships it has built with these organizations by inviting a member from one of these groups to each meeting and by promoting important events throughout the year and/or designating volunteers to assist as our schedules allow:

- Shred Day/Prescription Drug Drop Off Day Each year in/around April
- Bike Giveaway Each year in/around April
- 9K for K9 Each year in/around July

Continue to support efforts of SRTS in community outreach and awareness. Assist with communication to city neighborhoods.

Additional Tasks

- SAFE Outreach
- Work with Engineering on community member requests; consider adding time to each meeting to prioritize incoming community traffic control requests.
- Review Requests for Service applications for potential prioritization within the SAFE program
- Review requests for ADA improvements, acting as the Community Planning Advisory Council, for prioritization within the ADA transition plan.
- Maintain open communication and a positive relationship with the Milwaukie Police Department and Clackamas County Fire Department. Schedule some time during an upcoming meeting for an update about the police department (trends, policies, procedures, etc.).
- Support and aid Milwaukie's CAReFree Sundays event to establish communication between the two groups and see what opportunities exist for PSAC to participate.
- Work with Planning to ensure Neighborhood Hubs Project connects with proposed SAFE projects.
