Welcome / Review Minutes

PARB welcomed their new board member, Max Penneck, and introduced themselves. PARB reviewed the June 2023 minutes, first motioned by V.P., seconded by H.B., approved by PARB.

May 2023 minutes were not reviewed and will be included on the August PARB meeting.

Public Comment (General)

No comments received.

Discussion: NCPRD Monthly Division Report

The group discussed the format for the NCPRD update to PARB. The July agenda included a link to the District Advisory Committee (DAC) minutes. Moving forward the DAC report will be linked. PARB asked for staff to share links to the most recent NCPRD division report in the PARB meeting packets, and for Heather K to give a brief update during the meetings on key items related to Milwaukie parks followed by PARB questions.

General City Update

City staff shared information about a pending tree removal in Scott Park due to condition decline. The city and NCPRD are coordinating on the removal and tree permit.

Discussion: PARB Calendar

City staff shared the meeting location calendar shared with PARB in March 2023. PARB discussed upcoming PARB meetings, including options for meeting in person and virtually, upcoming holiday conflicts and considerations, and locations of meetings. PARB agreed to meet virtually in August (4:30pm start) and in person in September (5:00pm start). Staff will bring a calendar for 2023/2024 to the next PARB meeting for the group's consideration.

Discussion: Land Acknowledgement

PARB discussed the group's interest in including a land acknowledgement for PARB meetings. The group showed support for learning more about the history of indigenous communities in Milwaukie and asking if tribal representatives would be interested in coming to future PARB meetings. Staff shared that they would discuss this with the incoming diversity, equity and inclusion program manager for the city as well as the existing staff liaison for the Grand Ronde tribe.

Discussion: PARB Goals

PARB discussed the existing goals (adopted at the March 2023 PARB meeting) and reserving time in the meeting agenda for goal discussion along with tracking goal progress in the PARB minutes, which is a PARB goal itself. The group will think about further defining the metrics for each goal and the strategies for implementing the goals. Staff will reshare the goal list with PARB, and PARB members will revisit exploring and sharing ideas at a future meeting.

Goal: Revisit goals in PARB meetings and actions

Subgoal: Identify strategy to track progress of PARB annual goals in PARB meetings

Park Development Update

The city's developing parks (Scott, Balfour, Bowman Brae) is hitting 75% design and entering the later stages of development where design decisions are finalized and difficult to change. The Balfour Park and Bowman Brae Park designs will be going to the Planning Commission for a Type III Land Use Review Public Hearing on Tuesday, August 22nd at City Hall. At this meeting, Planning Commission will be reviewing the designs for considerations and variances to zoning, land use, surrounding impacts. PARB members are invited and encouraged to write in testimony or attend the meeting in person.

PARB shared that calendar invites for the planning meeting would be appreciated and helpful. Staff will share a reminder and an invite closer to the Planning Commission meeting.

The city wrapped up the playground engagement and finalized the summaries which are available on the park projects website (milwaukieoregon.gov/parkprojects). Staff are now working with project consultants to convey these learnings in the park designs.

PARB discussed the proposed and past tree preservation and tree removals for the developing parks. Staff shared that a horse chestnut tree was able to be preserved, and that some minor design changes will occur to retain the tree with the new installations. Staff informed PARB that no healthy trees in any of the three park projects are being proposed for removal, and the trees that may be or have been removed have had public safety and condition decline concerns. All tree removals followed the public tree code requirements.

Staff shared that there were community comments around including more activation spaces and play at Bowman Brae park. From these comments, staff are exploring deviating from the design and are considering new options for play infrastructure for use in Bowman Brae.

PARB heard an update on the surveys received from the park development projects, including that almost half of the survey respondents were from outside Milwaukie city limits. Staff shared that an update was given to Council which included information about the budget opportunities and limitations. The next Council meeting with a park update will be in October.

PARB learned more about an upcoming open house where surveys and proposed designs will be shared with the community for feedback. The city is hoping to learn more about how the community would like to see engagement around parks in the future, and celebrate the neighborhood park designs before construction. PARB may be asked to help volunteer with the event if possible.

Staff will bring some play structure design options to PARB at the September meeting for their feedback.

Johnson Creek Watershed Council cleanup events are happening this summer, sign up on the watershed council website. Salmon have been seen in the Willamette and Johnson Creek adjacent to Milwaukie – shows the critical habitat presence.

Asset Development

The purpose of the Asset Development program is to coordinate and manage current and long-range planning, the acquisition of park land, all aspects of the District's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and the repair and replacement of capital assets in order to provide recreation facilities that serve District residents. *(Capital repair & replace will be included in Division Report for Parks, Trails and Natural Areas).*

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- **Park at Jennings Lodge Campus:** NCPRD, Oregon City School District, and consultant Mackenzie kicked off the project to begin planning and design for the site.
- **Trails System Plan:** Submitted grant application to Oregon Department of Transportation for \$264,000 to conduct detailed trails planning in 2024 (following up from broader System Plan).

CURRENT PROJECTS/TASKS

- **Community Park & Center at Concord Property:** Prepare construction documents for the play area and for community center; prepare applications for grading and building permits; seek Board approval for construction IGA; seek Board approval for Guaranteed Maximum Price amendment for park and site (excluding play area).
- **Metro Local Share:** Finalize the intergovernmental agreement between Metro and NCPRD to distribute funds.
- **Park at Jennings Lodge Campus:** Conduct pre-planning and develop engagement plan.
- **System Plan:** Finalize contract with Design Workshop and recruit interns.
- **Staffing:** Interview finalists to fill Principal Planner vacancy.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **Concord Property:** Finalize construction mobilization and construction start date in September/October; finalize construction documents for play area and community center; seek Board approval for Guaranteed Maximum Price amendment for play area and building.
- **System Plan:** Kick off project.
- **Park at Jennings Lodge Campus:** Begin analysis and engagement events with NCPRD community.
- **Strategy and Polling work:** Provide further information to NCPRD Board.

- Staff is working on year-end tasks:

Marketing and Communications

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- **Outside Insider e-newsletter:** Sent to 9,448 subscribers with a 42% open rate, promoting NCPRD's current and upcoming fall programs and special events ([view here](#)).
- **Concerts in the Park Promotion:** Completed promotion of NCPRD's Concert in the Park series, which included a mix of flyers, posters, signage, Discovery Guide brochures, paid social campaigns and other digital promotion. The social campaign resulted in 158,265 total impressions, 1,270+ post engagements and 1,966 Facebook event responses. See page 6 for event attendance numbers.
- **Fall Program Promotion:** Developed a suite of materials to promote fall programs and events, in preparation for registration opening on August 1. The promotional materials included the Discovery Guide in a gatefold brochure format, which gets inserted into the Clackamas Review, distributed at facilities, and mailed to NCPRD's email list.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- **Groundbreaking Event:** Planning for the joint groundbreaking event for the new park and library on the Concord Property, in coordination with Clackamas County and Oak Lodge Library. The event is scheduled for September 16. More information to come.
- **Brochures:** Updating and reprinting the Aquatic Park, Milwaukie Community Center and Trolley Trail brochures.
- **Year in Review:** Coordinating with staff to begin collecting stats and successes for the 2022-2023 Year in Review.

LOOKING AHEAD

- **Awareness campaign:** NCPRD will be developing concepts for an awareness campaign, designed to increase engagement across all departments.

Older Adult Services

The purpose of the Older Adult Services program is to provide coordinated nutritional, transportation, educational and social service programming to the communities' older adults and persons with disabilities; assisting them in remaining independent and helping them thrive in their later years.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Nutrition Program held its annual Great American BBQ on July 14. Everyone enjoyed the traditional BBQ fare along with live music by Throwback. The addition of lawn games made the atmosphere even more enjoyable and engaging. Approximately 100 people attended this event.



- The Transportation Program has been making the most of the beautiful weather by increasing its travel trips. Offering approximately two trips per month that are open to the general public, these excursions are designed to cover their own costs and, when fully booked, generate revenue for the Transportation Program. In July, two exciting destinations were featured: Cannon Beach and the Marquam Hill Ranch Alpaca Farm.



PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- The Nutrition Program is looking for volunteers to pick blueberries at Stringfield Park. When NCPRD acquired Stringfield Park, it came with a mature blueberry patch. These berries are harvested, frozen and then delivered in various ways in the Meals on Wheels program throughout the year.

LOOKING AHEAD

- The MCC is collaborating with the ZGF architectural firm, who generously offered their Pro Bono services for color consultation and design of the front lobby reception area. We aim to create a fresh and inviting atmosphere that appeals to patrons of all ages. This painting project is scheduled to take place during the maintenance week in September.

Parks, Trails and Natural Areas

The purpose of the Parks, Trails and Natural Areas program is to provide management, maintenance and ongoing stewardship services to NCPRD residents and visitors so they can access safe, clean and well maintained parks, trails and natural areas both now and into the future.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Purchased a 2023 ford f250, ¾ ton route truck.
- Benches painted in most parks.
- Mulched all beds at Milwaukie Bay Park.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- All irrigation is on throughout the district.
- Parks are busy, picnics and sporting activities are districtwide.
- Assisting with Concord project.
- Alma Myra Playground replacement project has been delayed due to a design issue regarding slide bracing. A new bracket has been manufactured and is on its way to be installed. The opening has been delayed. The new projected opening date is 8/24/2023.

- Hazard tree removals were done at North Clackamas Park, Scott Park and the Trolley Trail.
- Power outage at the Milwaukie Community Center (MCC), caused by down power lines due to a motor vehicle accident, on 7/27/2023. Staff ran emergency generator.
- Pruning is ongoing.
- Estimates for Altamont walking path connection.
- Contracting for hardwood gym floors coatings at Concord Property, Clackamas Property.
- Estimates for MCC food service equipment replacement.
- Estimates for MCC pool room renovation.
- Event Support:

Recreation

The purpose of the NCPRD Recreation program is to provide a variety of recreational and educational opportunities directly and in partnership with other providers to enhance personal health and the quality of life for all residents of the District.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Our FREE Concert in the Park event series kicked off on Saturday, July 8 at the Milwaukie Bay Park. Gorgeous views, dance-worthy tunes from The Nu Wavers, games and crafts for the kids, duck races to support Milwaukie Parks Foundation and mouthwatering food and drinks were enjoyed by a little over 1,400 people in attendance - nearly double from last year's attendance.
- Kenari Quartet performed at North Clackamas Park on Friday, July 14 as our second Concert in the Park. 210 attendees enjoyed chamber music sitting outdoors among the trees during golden hour.



- Red Yarn and his Critter friends wrapped up our Concert in the Park series at Ardenwald Park on Thursday, July 20. Approximately 450 attended, many of them children, for an afternoon of storytelling through folk music. The park was packed with lots of happy, smiling faces.

Attendees enjoyed tasty food from Neighborhood Creamery and Little Bear Vietnamese Street food and free face painting and balloon animals among the kid's activities.



- NCPRD sponsored the Fifth Annual Oak Grove Festival in Downtown Oak Grove on Saturday, July 15 while hosting a plethora of kid's activities including crafts, circus performances, stilt walking and a bubble dance party. Our very own Director, Michael Bork, provided balloon animals. Deputy Director, Dominic Cortinas, discussed the upcoming system plan at the information booth and handed out giveaways at the prize wheel.



- All three STEAMventures camps: Blast Off, Mini World in a Bottle and Behind the Scenes are underway. Participants can learn how rockets take off, create a terrarium and mini ecosystem and learn about light and sound while creating their own puppet show. Instructed by two teachers who bring decades of experience working with school age children in school and camp settings, these camps provided a truly fun, interactive, educational and meaningful encounter.



- Strength and Relaxation Yoga in the Park every Thursday from 11 a.m. to noon at North Clackamas Park has been incredibly successful running at capacity with a waitlist. This program will run through September 14.

- *Luca*, our first Movie in the Park screening was successful with 550 in attendance on Saturday, July 22 at Concord School Property. The premiere sponsor, Sunshine Early Learning, had a booth and gave out free popcorn. NCPRD and North Clackamas School District (NCSD) had information booths along with the NCPRD's kid activities. Thank you to volunteers with the National Charity League for helping with kids activities and distributing notifications to neighbors prior to the movie.
- **The RecMobile has been visiting 10 select parks throughout the District, Monday – Friday, offering free drop-in activities to the surrounding neighborhoods for children ages 6-10.** The RecMobile has also been very busy assisting kids in creating crafts and playing games at summer events. A total of 61 children stopped by RecMobile at the Concert in the Park at Milwaukie Bay Park, 106 children at the Oak Grove Festival and 15 children at the Concert in the Park at Ardenwald Park.
- By utilizing newly trained instructors, Aquatic Park staff successfully added 10 swim lesson classes - for a total of 50 additional participants from the waitlists.
- Aquatic staff taught another American Red Cross Lifeguard course with 12 students. Of those new guards, we are hiring seven to join our team!
- Summer started out busy at the Aquatic Park with 14 groups attending our public swims. Three of our larger groups were from Self Enhancement Incorporated (SEI) and one from the Immigrant & Refugee Community Organization (IRCO).
- On July 21, NCPRD hosted the Adaptive and Inclusive Summer Social at the Concord School Property, bringing together 24 participants for a day of socializing, music, games and spatter painting. It was a heartwarming event enjoyed by all!
- The Summer Nights League, featuring 41 adult softball teams, was completed with the Champions being crowned the first week of August. Games are held five days a week on the Adrienne Nelson High School fields.
- North Clackamas Park proudly hosted the 14B State Championship, attracting 19 teams from across the state to participate in the three-day tournament. The grand finale saw Mound Time emerge victorious, securing a 12-3 victory and claiming the first-place title. Staffs' successful coordination of the event involved processing registrations, collaboration with the local district USA Softball representative, youth fast pitch umpire organization, as well as meticulous staffing and field preparation/maintenance.



- Summer camps have been successful, with the fifth of eight total weeks coming to a close in July. Hundreds of children have had a great time building new friendships and learning new

skills while participating in our camps, including Outdoor Extravaganza, Track and Field, Tennis, Flag Football, Pre-Kindergarten Multi-Sport and Craft, Cooking and Dance and Tumbling.



- Fall registration began on August 1. Many programs and sports teams filled quickly.

PROJECTS/TASKS BEING WORKED ON

- Staff continue to coordinate and plan Fiesta Latina en el Parque.
- Planning has begun for Winter Celebrations on Saturday, December 2 from 10 a.m. to noon at the MCC.
- During July we completed interviews for the new full time shift coordinator at the Aquatic Park.
- Staff is collecting quotes for two facility upgrades at the Aquatic Park. One is for an air curtain for the lobby entrance and the other will be to replace seven check valves in our pool supply systems.
- Staff is preparing for the Sideout Volleyball season for children in grades 1-8.
- In partnership with the Clackamas County A-Team, we are organizing the 8th Annual Clackamas County Cornhole Championship. Twenty-eight teams of two will toss to have their names engraved on the championship trophy. Another 14 teams, including the five NCPRD Board of Directors, will vie to have their names emblazoned on the Commissioners Cup.

LOOKING AHEAD

RELIGIOUS AND CULTURAL OBSERVANCES

This calendar is a resource designed to encourage public awareness of the diverse religious and ethnic groups in our community. However, because of the great number of religious, ethnic, and cultural groups who reside in the United States, we recognize that this resource cannot provide an exhaustive list for all of our faith traditions.

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AL HIJRA (MUHARRAM) Remembrance of the migration of Muhammad (Peace be upon Him) and followers to Medina.

ALL HALLOWS EVE (HALLOWEEN) Also known as Samhain, the ancient Celtic festival is a celebration of the end of the harvest season. The ancient Gaels believed that on October 31st, the boundary between the living and the deceased dissolved. This day is also celebrated as the eve of All Saints Day.

ALL SAINTS DAY Celebration of lives of all the saints, especially those who do not have a special day.

ALL SOULS DAY Day of prayer, remembrance and intercession for the dead.

ASCENSION DAY Celebrates Jesus' ascent into heaven.

ASCENSION of Abdu'l-Bahá marking the passing of 'Abdu'l-Bahá in 1921.

ASCENSION OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH A commemoration of the death of Bahá'u'lláh.

ASH WEDNESDAY Begins Christian Lent; name derives from symbolic use of ashes to signify penitence.

ASHURA A one-day fast to commemorate God freeing The Children of Israel and Moses from Pharaoh.

CORPUS CHRISTI This is a feast in honor of the institution of the Eucharist during the Last Supper.

AYYÁM-I-HÁ This period adjusts the Bahá'í year to the solar calendar. It leads to the 19 day fast; each day of Ayyám-i-Há is marked by a different virtue like hospitality, gift-giving or charity.

BELTANE Festival to celebrate the beginning of summer.

BIRTH OF BAHÁ'U'LLÁH Commemorates the birth of the founder of the Bahá'í faith in 1817.

BIRTH OF B'ÁB Anniversary of the birth of one of the twin prophet founders of the Bahá'í faith.

BIRTH OF GURU GOBIND SINGH Anniversary of the birth of the tenth guru.

BODHI DAY Celebration of the enlightenment of Buddha, c. 596 B.C.E.

BUDDHA DAY (VISAKHA PUJA) Celebration of the birth of Buddha.

CHRISTMAS Celebration of the birth of Christ.

DAY OF THE COVENANT Celebration of the covenant given in the last will and testament of Bahá'u'lláh.

DIWALI (DEEPAVALI) Festival of Lights; one of four seasonal celebrations in India.

DORMITION OF THE THEOTOKOS The Orthodox Christian commemoration of the death and burial of the Virgin Mary.

EASTER Celebration of the resurrection of Christ.

EPIPHANY End of the 12 days of Christmas; celebrates visit of the three kings to baby Jesus; especially important to Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholics.

FEAST OF THE SOLEMNITY OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD A celebration of the holiness of Mary as the chosen bearer of Jesus.

FOUR CHAPLAINS SUNDAY Commemoration of the four Chaplains of Jewish and Christian traditions who gave their life jackets to others as a ship sank in the Atlantic Ocean during World War II.

GOOD FRIDAY The Friday of Jesus' crucifixion.

HANUKKAH Festival of lights; eight-day commemoration of the rededication of the Second Temple in 165 B.C.E. The eight candle Menorah is lighted.

HOLA MOHALLA A day to commemorate the valor and bravery of the Sikhs. This 3-day festival consists of mock battles, music and poetry reading.

HOLI Spring festival; a carnival occasion featuring bright colors, pilgrimages and bonfires.

HOLIKA DAHAN Celebrates the killing of Holika (the devil) by Vishnu.

EID AL-ADHA Festival of sacrifice; commemorates the faith of Abraham and the near sacrifice of Ishmael; as well as the Muslim Pilgrims making Hajj.

EID AL-FITR Festival of the breaking of the fast of Ramadan.

IMBOLC Festival celebrating the beginning of spring.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION Day of celebrating the belief that Mary, mother of Jesus, was preserved from original sin all of her life.

INSTALLATION OF THE GURU GRANTH SAHIB Commemorates the installation of the Sikh scriptures by Guru Gobind Singh; these scriptures were installed as the perpetual guru.

JUNETEENTH Also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day, it commemorates the announcement of the abolition of slavery.

KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI Birthday of Lord Krishna. It falls on the 8th day of the dark half of the month of Bhadrapada (August-September). A 24-hour fast is observed on this day and is broken at midnight.

KWANZAA Seven day spiritual celebration of African-American values and traditions and their continued vitality. "Kwanzaa" is Swahili and means "first fruits of the harvest."

LAILAT AL MIRAJ Observance of Muhammad's (Peace be upon Him) night journey from Mecca to Jerusalem and his ascension to heaven.

LAILAT AL BARA'AH Night of Forgiveness. A night of prayer to Allah for forgiveness of the dead. Preparation for Ramadan through intense prayer.

LAILAT AL-QADR Night of Destiny. First revelation of Qur'an to Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him). Observed during the last ten days of Ramadan.

LITHA Midsummer festival marking the summer solstice.

LENT Period of preparation for Easter, usually 40 days before. Clean Monday signifies the beginning of the Lenten period.

LUGHNASADH Festival celebrating the beginning of the harvest season.

MABON Harvest festival marking the autumnal equinox.

MAGHI Commemorates the battle in which 40 Sikhs (the Immortal Ones) laid down their lives for the guru (Guru Gobind Singh).

MARTYRDOM OF THE B'ÁB Anniversary of the martyrdom of the B'ab, the forerunner of Bahá'u'lláh, in 1850.

MARTYRDOM OF GURU ARJAN DEV Anniversary of the martyrdom of Guru Arjan Dev in 1606 C. E., the fifth guru who had built the Golden Temple of Amritsar.

MAUNDY THURSDAY Also known as Holy Thursday, this day celebrates the institution of the Eucharist (or Holy Communion) at Jesus' Last Supper.

MAWLID AL-NABI Birthday of the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him), c. 570 C. E.

NAVARATRI Hindu Festival of the divine mother honoring Durga, wife of Shiva, and seeking her blessings. Also observed as a celebration recalling the days of Lord Krishna.

NAW-RUZ Bahá'í and Iranian New Year.

NINETEEN DAY FAST A fast observed by adult Bahá'ís in good health from sunrise to sundown.

NIRVANA DAY Commemorates the death of Buddha.

OSTARA Festival marking the spring equinox.

PALM/PASSION SUNDAY Celebrates the arrival of Jesus into Jerusalem during Passover. This also commemorates the beginning of Holy Week.

PENTECOST Fifty days after Easter, this time celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon early Christians following the ascension of Jesus.

PESACH (PASSOVER) Marks the deliverance of the Jews from slavery in Egypt; Seder ceremonies retell the story and celebrate freedom.

PIONEER DAY Observance of the arrival of Brigham Young and early Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) settlers in Salt Lake City, Utah.

PURIM Feast of Lots; celebrates the deliverance of Jews in ancient Persia from a plot to destroy them.

RAMADAN The ninth month in the Islamic calendar; 30 days of strict fasting from sunup to sundown in honor of the first revelations to the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him).

RIDVAN Commemorates the declaration of Bahá'u'lláh to his followers in 1863. Work is suspended for the 1st, 9th and 12th day.

ROSH HASHANAH New Year; begins 10 days of penitence ending on Yom Kippur.

SAMHAIN Festival celebrating the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter.

SHAVUOT Festival of Weeks; celebrates harvest of first fruits and commemorates the giving of the Torah and Commandments at Mt' Sinai.

SHEMINI ATZERET Eighth and last day of Sukkot.

SIMCHAT TORAH Joyous festival in which the reading of the Torah is completed and its first book begun again. Symbolized by singing, dancing and marching around the synagogue with Torah scrolls.

ST. STEPHEN'S DAY Day of remembrance for St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr.

SUKKOT Festival of Booths (or tabernacles) and the fall harvest.

TISHA B'AV A day of mourning and repentance in remembrance of the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem.

VAISAKHI Anniversary of the creation of the Khalsa (the army of the Pure Ones) in 1699.

WESAK Commemoration of Buddha's birth, enlightenment, and death, celebrated on the day of the full moon of the sixth month in the Theravada tradition.

WORLD RELIGION DAY Day founded in 1950 by the National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of the United States to address the need for religious unity.

YOM HA-SHO'AH Holocaust Remembrance Day. Memorializes the six million Jews who died in the Holocaust. Observance is not limited to Jews.

YOM KIPPUR Day of Atonement; a day of prayer, fasting and repentance

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- Dates of holidays and festivals were researched to the best of our abilities. These dates may vary depending on region and affiliation. We strive to make this resource accurate and inclusive. If you see an error or omission, please tell us (email at nccj@nccjtriad.org)
- Bahá'í, Jewish, and Muslim holidays begin at sunset on the evening before date listed.
- Buddhist, Hindu, and Sikh holidays may be observed at different times than those indicated here. The observance dates depend on both religious group affiliation and region. For example, Buddha's birthday is one of the most widely celebrated of Buddhist holidays. However, no one date is accepted by all Buddhists.
- Christians follow a number of different calendars depending on their denomination and/or region. This calendar includes dates for the Gregorian (Western) calendar, which is mostly followed by the Roman Catholic Church and Protestant denominations, as well as dates for the Orthodox New Calendar, which is the same as the Gregorian calendar for fixed holidays and observances but uses the Julian calendar for moveable feasts. The Orthodox New Calendar is primarily used by the Greek and Cypriot Orthodox Churches.
- We recognize that for many Christians, the observance of days that commemorate the lives of saints is an integral part of their faith. Many of these days have not been included as part of this calendar because they are vast in number and observance differs greatly by region, denomination, and personal belief.
- Jewish dates in this calendar are generally in accordance with Orthodox tradition. The length of some holidays and extent to which they are observed vary according to denominational affiliation.
- Muslim holidays follow the lunar calendar, aligned with the phases and sightings of the moon.
- The Sikh calendar — their own Nanakshahi calendar — was adopted on March 14, 1999 and aligns with the Gregorian (Western) Calendar.

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GOOD FRIDAY The Friday of Jesus' crucifixion.

HANUKKAH Festival of lights; eight-day commemoration of the dedication of the Second Temple in 165 B.C.E. The eight candle Menorah is lighted.

HOLA MOHALLA A day to commemorate the valor and bravery of the Sikhs. This 3-day festival consists of mock battles, music and poetry reading.

HOLI Spring festival; a carnival occasion featuring bright colors, pilgrimages and bonfires.

HOLIKA DAHAN Celebrates the killing of Holika (the devil) by Vishnu.

EID AL-ADHA Festival of sacrifice; commemorates the faith of Abraham and the near sacrifice of Ishmael; as well as the Muslim Pilgrims making Hajj.

EID AL-FITR Festival of the breaking of the fast of Ramadan.

IMBOLC Festival celebrating the beginning of spring.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION Day of celebrating the belief that Mary, mother of Jesus, was preserved from original sin all of her life.

INSTALLATION OF THE GURU GRANTH SAHIB Commemorates the installation of the Sikh scriptures by Guru Gobind Singh; these scriptures were installed as the perpetual guru.

JUNETEENTH Also known as Freedom Day or Emancipation Day, it commemorates the announcement of the abolition of slavery.

KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI Birthday of Lord Krishna. It falls on the 8th day of the dark half of the month of Bhadrapada (August-September). A 24-hour fast is observed on this day and is broken at midnight.

KWANZAA Seven day spiritual celebration of African-American values and traditions and their continued vitality. "Kwanzaa" is Swahili and means "first fruits of the harvest."

LAILAT AL MIRAJ Observance of Muhammad's (Peace be upon Him) night journey from Mecca to Jerusalem and his ascension to heaven.

LAILAT AL BARA'AH Night of Forgiveness. A night of prayer to Allah for forgiveness of the dead. Preparation for Ramadan through intense prayer.

LAILAT AL-QADR Night of Destiny. First revelation of Qur'an to Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him). Observed during the last ten days of Ramadan.

LITHA Midsummer festival marking the summer solstice.

LENT Period of preparation for Easter, usually 40 days before. Clean Monday signifies the beginning of the Lenten period.

LUGHNASADH Festival celebrating the beginning of the harvest season.

MABON Harvest festival marking the autumnal equinox.

MAGHI Commemorates the battle in which 40 Sikhs (the Immortal Ones) laid down their lives for the guru (Guru Gobind Singh).

MARTYRDOM OF THE B'ÁB Anniversary of the martyrdom of the B'ab, the forerunner of Bahá'u'lláh, in 1850.

MARTYRDOM OF GURU ARJAN DEV Anniversary of the martyrdom of Guru Arjan Dev in 1606 C. E., the fifth guru who had built the Golden Temple of Amritsar.

MAUNDY THURSDAY Also known as Holy Thursday, this day celebrates the institution of the Eucharist (or Holy Communion) at Jesus' Last Supper.

MAWLID AL-NABI Birthday of the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him), c. 570 C. E.

NAVARATRI Hindu Festival of the divine mother honoring Durga, wife of Shiva, and seeking her blessings. Also observed as a celebration recalling the days of Lord Krishna.

NAW-RUZ Bahá'í and Iranian New Year.

NINETEEN DAY FAST A fast observed by adult Bahá'ís in good health from sunrise to sundown.

NIRVANA DAY Commemorates the death of Buddha.

OSTARA Festival marking the spring equinox.

PALM/PASSION SUNDAY Celebrates the arrival of Jesus into Jerusalem during Passover. This also commemorates the beginning of Holy Week.

PENTECOST Fifty days after Easter, this time celebrates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon early Christians following the ascension of Jesus.

PESACH (PASSOVER) Marks the deliverance of the Jews from slavery in Egypt; Seder ceremonies retell the story and celebrate freedom.

PIONEER DAY Observance of the arrival of Brigham Young and early Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) settlers in Salt Lake City, Utah.

PURIM Feast of Lots; celebrates the deliverance of Jews in ancient Persia from a plot to destroy them.

RAMADAN The ninth month in the Islamic calendar; 30 days of strict fasting from sunup to sundown in honor of the first revelations to the Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon Him).

RIDVAN Commemorates the declaration of Bahá'u'lláh to his followers in 1863. Work is suspended for the 1st, 9th and 12th day.

ROSH HASHANAH New Year; begins 10 days of penitence ending on Yom Kippur.

SAMHAIN Festival celebrating the end of the harvest season and the beginning of winter.

SHAVUOT Festival of Weeks; celebrates harvest of first fruits and commemorates the giving of the Torah and Commandments at Mt' Sinai.

SHEMINI ATZERET Eighth and last day of Sukkot.

SIMCHAT TORAH Joyous festival in which the reading of the Torah is completed and its first book begun again. Symbolized by singing, dancing and marching around the synagogue with Torah scrolls.

ST. STEPHEN'S DAY Day of remembrance for St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr.

SUKKOT Festival of Booths (or tabernacles) and the fall harvest.

TISHA B'AV A day of mourning and repentance in remembrance of the destruction of the First and Second Temples in Jerusalem.

VAISAKHI Anniversary of the creation of the Khalsa (the army of the Pure Ones) in 1699.

WESAK Commemoration of Buddha's birth, enlightenment, and death, celebrated on the day of the full moon of the sixth month in the Theravada tradition.

WORLD RELIGION DAY Day founded in 1950 by the National Spiritual Assembly of the Bahá'ís of the United States to address the need for religious unity.

YOM HA-SHO'AH Holocaust Remembrance Day. Memorializes the six million Jews who died in the Holocaust. Observance is not limited to Jews.

YOM KIPPUR Day of Atonement; a day of prayer, fasting and repentance

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- Dates of holidays and festivals were researched to the best of our abilities. These dates may vary depending on region and affiliation. We strive to make this resource accurate and inclusive. If you see an error or omission, please tell us (email nccj@nccjtriad.org)
- Bahá'í, Jewish, and Muslim holidays begin at sunset on the evening before the date listed.
- Buddhist, Hindu, and Sikh holidays may be observed at different times than those indicated here. The observance dates depend on both religious group affiliation and region. For example, Buddha's birthday is one of the most widely celebrated of Buddhist holidays. However, no one date is accepted by all Buddhists.
- Christians follow a number of different calendars depending on their denomination and/or region. This calendar includes dates for the Gregorian (Western) calendar, which is mostly followed by the Roman Catholic Church and Protestant denominations, as well as dates for the Orthodox New Calendar, which is the same as the Gregorian calendar for fixed holidays and observances but uses the Julian calendar for moveable feasts. The Orthodox New Calendar is primarily used by the Greek and Cypriot Orthodox Churches.
- We recognize that for many Christians, the observance of days that commemorate the lives of saints is an integral part of their faith. Many of these days have not been included as part of this calendar because they are vast in number and observance differs greatly by region, denomination, and personal belief.
- Jewish dates in this calendar are generally in accordance with Orthodox tradition. The length of some holidays and extent to which they are observed vary according to denominational affiliation.
- Muslim holidays are subject to change because observance follows the lunar calendar, aligned with the phases and sightings of the moon.
- The Sikh calendar — their own Nanakshahi calendar — was adopted on March 14, 1999 and aligns with the Gregorian (Western) Calendar.
