A. Reports-

Work being done around shelters:

-in 2020 a conversation with community showed there was an interest in behavioral health

-there are now two positions (one paid by city and one paid by county)

-These two positions on behavioral health—Don Holden (paid by county-loved one)

-Another full time employee funded by county through central concerns will also be working on mental health and houseless services

-These individuals are working with people in need and as well as the police department

Adam Brown Human services co-director is helping with funding for some of these services

-one piece looking at is a 23 hour stability center in milwaukie

Cooling Centers Options

-Leding library is currently being evaluated for a cooling center (extending hours to 10 pm to allow for this as well as behavioral health services)

-St Paul United methodist on Linwood might be another cooling center

Milwaukie Lutheran

Grace point is a shower location for loved one events

Odd Fellows might be another option for cooling center

-Warming centers are more complicated: at least 90 days of facility usage-need shower, kitchen, and rest space.

-Conversations with churches is part of the conversation

-Wichita center is currently maxed out on their use for school district—not likely to have more space option

-likely going to be \$60k a year just for one person to run before other services

-For a full center it is likely going to be a couple of hundred thousand \$

-Volunteers for shelters requires training programs as well as a de-escalation background to keep environment safe for everyone

-from families with small children to elderly

- one shelter close to transit is a good start
- transport is another cost (i.e. moving people between shelters such as Canby-Oregon City)

Ann is working with Brandi at Loved one's as they have the most experience in the region
-recent conversation with the city manager in Molala has expressed the influx of funding has been strong recently—City of milwaukie has not received funding yet-

-a human service agency requires staff, and we currently do not have that staff.

-county funding comes from meeting certain threshold, and city of milwaukie is currently looking at meeting those thresholds

-Human services funds are funded from federal gov't to county.

-goal is looking towards 20 beds as a service (Father's Heart in Oregon City is 49 during an emergency situation)

-the use of school facilities is an ongoing conversation that requires navigating the scheduling of Extra curricular (Hector Campbell school is currently a possible option being considered

—cooling center at library is primary goal (by may)

—everything else is at least one year out

—Adam Brown is a person the community can speak with if they are concerned

—ten year plan to reduce and end homelessness is a model brought from Utah (Salt Lake County—a leader for the country)

—Dan Harris will be another primary person brought in to work on this shelter as well.

B. Milwaukie Police Report Tony Cereghino -

-Don has helped to bring the people who are down and in need by getting people in contact with resources (for permanent housing and contact information)-one example of what Glenn and Don are doing to help people who are in need getting their mental health needs/ or identification

-Carl Dorman was released from training and is an officer on the road right now—there are 6 who are still in training

-we are now at regular staffing—2 staffing positions have been approved for transit

-Was a big fire off lake Rd behind Milwaukie Floral—sparking and arcing power lines made it quite an ordeal

-No other houses or properties or people were injured

-active use of drone program—officers have been going to a location for several weeks—

Sanchez and Johnson were able to get the drone up in time to locate the parole violator suspect—Spotlight on drone as well as Megaphone on drone allowed for a safe capture

-state will extradite suspect back to Montana

-organized retail theft missions are left to the discretion of the police officers to choose how to best help people in need—not all theft is incarcerated

-Mikes restaurant was damaged severely by a car running into the building so that the repair was catastrophic to the building

-there have been a number of fires in the milwaukie area—some of it is coincidental, some are potentially heaters in motor health

-Looking to hire another traffic control officer in November

C. Capital Improvement Plan Projects

- Just finished up the first residential surface repair throughout Milwaukie—all pavement happened within a week
- Washington area improvements has been awarded to happen end of October and construction happening in November
- Storm water pipeline on Meek project(along Railroad) is for slated for November
- 42nd and King will have temporary buildout next week (diverter)
- area will be studied over a period of several months to see how new traffic pattern effects flow in that area—This project is tied to the Logus/42nd SAFE project (also looking at 42nd and Harrison)
- in the next 12-18months this artery will be redesigned
- Finishing up Monroe apartments—Fencing will be moved and this will change the crosswalk
- A Rail order needs to be updated to move that crossing forward (will also happen on 37th and Washington at the same time
- King Rd Project is at 30% design with an open house response by public in early November
- October should see the beginning of the TSP advisory council Meeting

NDA Concerns PSAC Members

Lewelling— Safe routes to school project (2 year project)

- have the SAFE routes to school plan—9/19/23 presentation at City Hall
- Laid out the timeline for this project
- Now have the final report/draft (89 page document that identifies the changes on Logus, Stanley, Wichita, and King Road) based on Alta Engineering study
- The king rd portion will not go through the Safe Routes to school but rather the Milwaukie King Rd project
- The next step is to apply for the construction grant (starts in December/January). This application will get the neighborhood in Que. for that construction funding.
- The Infrastructure and Jobs Act funding will be gone in 2027 — The grants funding will increase from \$2 million -\$4 million
- The application funding happens in two cycles over two years—The city of Milwaukie will have to apply to for the grant
- The difficult part for city of Milwaukie is that these recommendations are not in the current CIP (capital improvement Program)—Looking to figure out how to anticipate this workload for 2025-2026
- How does the (stately rd greenway or Hollywood) tie into this funding question? Stanley is in the CIP however in 2007?
- county is doing a pavement project on Johnson Creek and Stanley—unclear how much we will get from that for pedestrians and bicycles.
- Linwood— heading onto Cedar-crest from railroad, there should be a turn left arrow that was not put in place during repaving project
- Hector Cambel—No Concerns
- Ardenwald—Johnson creek and 42nd intersection has a proposal for 61 units
- work that was done on Johnson creek and Roswell has stormwater that doesn't drain correctly.
- Island Station—Monday the Railroad trimmed but left mess...
- Lake Road- 37th and lake right above Rowe needs a continuing painted line
- Speed on Lake Rd feels unsafe due to speed.
- since school has started again, the high schoolers are driving very quickly at the same time the the middle schoolers are walking.

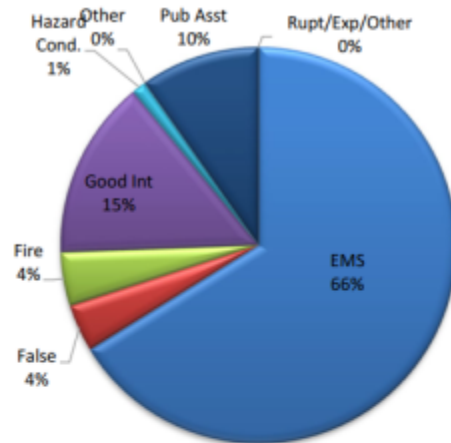

CFD September 28th, 2023 PSAC notes

Notes:

- During the month of August, the Fire District had a total monthly call volume of 2,784. This continues to demonstrate an increase in incidents when comparing to previous years. All types of incidents are seeing an increase but the primary area is EMS calls. By percentage, we are seeing a notable increase in fires as well. Year to date, we are approximately 1800 calls over last year and the year before.

- Significant Events:
 - Miles Fiberglass: In September, the Fire District responded to a significant fire at a large vacant building off of Otty Road, the former site of Miles Fiberglass. Due to the size of the building, fire damage, and the potential for hazardous materials, this incident lasted for an extended period of time. This building is owned by Clackamas County and was scheduled to be torn down in the coming months. Fire investigators determined the most probable cause was an intentionally set fire on the exterior.
- Upcoming Events:
 - Fire Prevention Month Open Houses
 - October 7th @ Station 6 from 1pm-3pm
 - October 14th @ Station 17 from 1pm-3pm
 - October 28th @ Station 18 from 1pm-3pm
- In October, the Fire District will be deploying apprentices through the Fire District. This is a new program that was funded by the State which results in an increase in staffing on our response apparatus. The program will run for approximately 2 years.

- The recent cooler temperatures and rainfall has allowed for the opening of backyard burning on October 1st. Prior to burning, please verify that you are outside of the DEQ burn boundary and that burning is allowed that day.
- October is Fire Prevention Month, the Fire District safety focus will be kitchen cooking safety, ladder safety, and Halloween safety.
 - Kitchen cooking safety:
 - Never leave cooking unattended
 - Never store items on top of their stove
 - If a grease fire occurs, cover the flame and do not put water on it, then call 911.
 - Gutter/Ladder Safety: please be extremely careful when on ladders anytime. Especially when cleaning gutters with the return of the rain. Never use a ladder that is too short and always have someone heel the ladder. If not confident, hire a professional. Each year the Fire District responds to numerous ladder falls.
 - Halloween Safety:
 - Ensure your kids are easily visible when trick or treating. Use a flashlight for added visibility.
 - Check their candy for signs of tampering or pre-opened and do not consume those.
